### The Egg and I

The time was the mid-1960s; the play was the panto *Aladdin*; the venue was the then- new **MacPherson Theatre**. I was cast as the Emperor of China. **Cliff Clarke** was the Dame.

We had some business in the knock-about laundry scene, where I had come in to complain about my underpants. Or something. Widow Twankey and Wishy-Washy set about my come-uppance by producing a (blown) egg, placing it with great ceremony in the top of my turban, then smashing it. I, in turn, produce another egg, present it to the audience like a magician, then exact a similar punishment, only this time in the Widow T.'s ample bodice.

So now it's closing night, after a successful run. Tony Burton, the director, has assembled the cast before curtain, to run through his stock speech about the un-professional nature of closing night pranks - you know the form, "Not fair to the audience... paid the same as any other audience... etc. " While this is going on, his wife, Audrey, is across the road at Quon Lee's buying eggs.

Word of this got round, so I was in full knowledge of my fate when I made my entrance to the laundry. There was Cliff, magnificent in his bizarre get-up and a gleam in his eye that can only be described as satanic. I stoically accepted my raw egg shampoo, with shell, knowing that soon sweet vengeance would be mine! I made a *bravura*, and that night totally honest, expression of disgust, then with a grin even more satanic than his, I plunged my wonderful, loaded egg into his bosom.

There, nested snugly in his considerable *embonpoint*, the damn thing was ENDWAYS ON! Now, if you know anything about structural engineering, or even kitchen folklore, you will realize that an ovoid shape, i.e. an egg, possesses enormous strength when a force is applied along its longitudinal axis. I simply could not get the damn thing to break! Here was I, on-stage at the **Mac** in front of a full house, alternately pressing and hammering on the Widow Twankey's tits! Cliff showed everyone the bruise afterwards.

I've no idea what the audience made of it. All I know is that I had egg on my face and he didn't.

A truly sobering lesson to all last-nighters who substitute rum for tea, and cause stage phones to ring. But I think this particular "fun" seems to have left the theatre in these more serious times. #### **Workshop Donations**

We love donations! And after a recent reorganization of our fabrics, it's apparent that we have an embarrassment of riches, so space is starting to become an issue. #### **Recent Additions**

We have recently purchased a professional-grade steamer for the Costume Workshop. It is available for all shows and the Loft, but it does require a bit of finesse, so if you plan to use it, please read the instructions first about filling, heating, steaming and shutting down/draining.

If you have been in the lower reaches of the theatre lately, you may have seen the wonderful new light table built for us by **Bill Adams**, for tracing sewing patterns (and anything else). It's getting lots of use right now on *Elizabeth Rex*.

**Mark Heine** and I have donated our washing machine to the laundry downstairs. It's a top-load agitator, primarily for use in distressing and dyeing fabrics/costumes. It may also be handy for high volumes of washing on shows, if it doesn't get too badly stained. Thanks to **Dick Newson** and **Julius Maslovat** for moving it and finding a way to sort it into the existing configuration.

#### The Riches of *Elizabeth Rex*

In looking for costumes for *Elizabeth Rex*, it quickly became apparent that the costume team would need to create most of them. So when the show comes down late in June, the Costume Loft will take possession of some amazing new pieces that are pretty much guaranteed to be popular rentals. The Costume Workshop will also have two new books on constructing Elizabethan clothing, and a treasure trove of Elizabethan sewing patterns, including a set of reproduction patterns for men's wardrobe, women's wardrobe, women's underpinnings, and accessories (hats, ruffs, bags, etc.). Best of all, the costume team will have (a lot more) experience in constructing pieces for this period.

#### Our own Pooh-Bah – Life Member Barry Grimshaw



Born and raised in Leeds, **Barry Grimshaw** began his theatrical career at age 10, as the youngest member of a concert party that toured around Yorkshire. After his successful audition, the husband and wife who ran the concert party came to his house.

While there, they asked if he had a pair of black shoes or boots. Unfortunately, Barry's wardrobe didn't stretch to black footwear so the Concert Master gave him a pair of his own. As a result, at the next concert, the diminutive tenyear old, who was to perform a solo musical rendition of Joyce Kilmer's "Trees," was forced to clump onto the stage in a pair of enormous, oversize black boots. As well as performing with the concert party, Barry was a member of the choir at St. George's Church in Leeds. At school he would often be asked to sing "Onward Christian Soldiers" at the morning assembly, and when the boy's section of the school were putting on The Merchant of Venice, 13-year old Barry was handed the part of Portia. Unfortunately, two Days before the opening, Barry lost his voice completely and was unable to perform. When his voice did recover it was several octaves deeper. It wasn't until several years later that the young boy realised he'd been cast in a girl's part.

The following year, at age 14, Barry, who had been working part time as a newsboy and a butcher's assistant, left school to work in the butcher shop full time. Barry stayed at the butcher shop until he, his brother **Paul**, his mother and stepfather emigrated to Canada in late November 1950. At that time Barry was 16. The family's first stop in Canada was to Barry's stepfather's brother who lived in Griffin, a tiny hamlet in Saskatchewan approximately 16 miles from Wavvern. When our lad from Leeds got out of the truck, it was so cold he wondered whether it would be safe to breathe. While in Griffin, the whole family went to a Christmas show at the village hall. Barry and Paul both had trouble keeping straight faces when a group of dancers in paper costumes performed on stage with their paper suits rustling and crinkling in time to the music. That was bad enough, but worse was to come. When the dancers had finished, the Master of Ceremonies called on a **Mr. Beard** to come and do a recitation. Mr. Beard walked slowly up the aisle from the back of the hall and as he passed the two young English boys, they could see he was sporting facial fur down to his knees. Their helpless laughter did not go down at all well with their Uncle Lloyd. In spite of that, Barry remembers Griffin with fondness. He recalls the wonderful people who were so friendly and generous to the

newly arrived émigrés. The whole family agreed that coming to Canada was the "ultimate."

In January 1951, the family moved on to Victoria. The first thing Barry did was to look for work. He tried to get a job as a meat cutter, as that was the trade he had learned in England, but no one in the butcher trade seemed to take the youngster seriously. So Barry finally found work in a laundry. During the time he worked there in sauna-like conditions, Barry sweated off several pounds so that after two years he emerged from the laundry in fighting fit condition. His next job was on a weather ship serving meals to the engineers and cleaning their cabins. According to the Chief Engineer, the November voyage was the worst the weather ship Stonetown had ever taken. The seas were extremely turbulent and Barry's seasickness was twice as bad as it had been on the HMS Franconia two years earlier. The weather ship was intended to stay put in a limited area in the ocean; however the storm was so bad, the crew who had been out for four weeks, were woken at midnight having been washed out of their cabins. They were dispatched to rescue an American ship, the SS Pennsylvania carrying a cargo of grain that, due to a leak in the hold, had become damp and swollen. As a result, the Pennsylvania was sinking. The weather ship, which had to travel 30 miles, was unable to go at speed. Barry recalls the ocean heaving and rolling, the surface littered with flares dropped from US planes and the water filled with "junk." Barry has vivid memories of that night and the desperate hope that they could rescue somebody, anybody, off the Pennsylvania. Unfortunately, there were 42 lost lives that night. Barry felt sick and tired, and the next morning he and a friend refused to get out of their bunks at the usual time. Their refusal lasted only until a very large member of the crew threw a bucket of water on them.

Shortly after his experience on the weather ship, Barry finally got a job as a butcher at **Avonlea Meat Market** on Douglas Street. He stayed there until he was made Manager of the Meat Department at **Lewis's** on Foul Bay Road. From there, Barry made specialty meat pies at **Lundines** until he opened his own pie shop in the Strathcona Block.

Barry's first stage appearance in Victoria was as Pooh-Bah in the **VOS** production of *The Mikado* in 1962 at **Oak Bay Junior High**, a role he reprised in the 1985 **VOS** production at the **MacPherson Playhouse**. This was followed by roles in several **VOS** and **Bastion Theatre** productions including *The Winslow Boy*, *The Red Mill*, and *The Merry Widow* directed by **Allan Purdy**, *Murder in the Cathedral* directed by **Audrey Johnson** and *Blood Wedding*, *Carnival* and *Lock Up Your Daughters*, under the direction of **Peter Mannering**. Barry's first role at **Langham Court Theatre** was as the Burgomaster in the 1975 production of *The Visit*. Since then, Barry has performed in more than 20 productions for the **Victoria Theatre Guild** including *The Sunshine Boys*, Cause Célebre, Go Back For Murder, Spider's Web, The Boy Friend, Bus Stop, 42<sup>nd</sup> Street, Money and Friends and, most recently, The Lady in the Van in which he strode on stage looking very much like a benevolent Bill Sykes. At the same time, he has been active with VOS in musicals such as My Fair Lady (in which he played Alfred Doolittle in both the 1978 and 1990 productions), South Pacific, and Guys and Dolls among others, and he has been seen on stage with other groups around Victoria and on Saltspring Island.

Although he had a limited amount of training in carpentry, Barry has become an invaluable member of the set construction crew at Langham Court Theatre. He joined the set-building team in September 2000 and has been working alongside Bill Adams, Dick Newson, Julius Maslovat, Bob Clark and others ever since. When not working with a hammer or a script, Barry reads to the residents of James Bay Lodge, who all enjoy the stories from James Herriot's books, stories that remind Barry of the glorious months during World War II when he and his brother were evacuated to a farm near Malton in North Yorkshire.
