Kane Ryan began his nomadic lifestyle at the age of four when he travelled for two years with his parents in a Volkswagen van throughout Central America. Born in Calgary, he moved to Victoria with his parents and his seashell collection from Mexico in 1988 as a six-year-old. He currently splits his time between Canada and India, using his photography and writing to raise awareness and funds for the **Dirty Wall Project Foundation**.

The Non Profit-Organisation

What is the Dirty Wall Project?

The **Dirty Wall Project** is an effort to fill immediate, small needs in the developing countries that I (Kane Ryan) travel in. I have travelled extensively for eight years and during that time I have sought out volunteering opportunities or ways to contribute to the local economies of the countries I visit. My frustrations with bureaucracy, paperwork and religious bias while trying to volunteer in India and other developing countries drove me to be a one-person charitable organisation. Being an independent travelller, I have the ability to meet local people in my search for basic lodging, meals and transportation. This enables me to build relationships, have conversations, and develop a sense of where my effort and the money raised for this project will be best spent. I am able to see a need and fill it immediately. I employ locals both to inspire me and to help me understand cultural differences. Together we are resourceful and adaptable, which enables us to work in unusual circumstances and less than ideal conditions. With the support of generous donors, we work together tirelessly in orphanages, slums, and have held numerous one-day health camps.

I may not change lives, but I can bring some comfort, food or a helping hand to someone who is living in dire poverty. The list of needs is endless in developing countries where the poor outnumber the rich.

The **Dirty Wall Project** has no overhead and no salaries to pay. I am a completely self-funded traveller. Every dollar donated to this project is spent entirely on filling the needs of the people I meet in India. The **Dirty Wall Project Foundation** is incorporated under the Society Act, issued at Victoria, British Columbia, on April 27th, 2010. (Number: S-56630)

The Elizabeth Rex Company needs:

Lisa Leighton, the Costume Designer for Elizabeth Rex is in urgent need of the following:

1. A lead hand for hair and wigs

We will probably rent the main Elizabeth wig, and, depending on the cost, perhaps some others. I need someone who can source, cost and organize those (I have some leads), as well as either do the hair for the other actors, or arrange to have hair people join the show, and supervise them.

Needs to: do period research from our resources and the Internet (some already done).

Works in collaboration with: costumes and hats/headwear. Original design or creative input: within my overall design; creative input welcome.

2. A lead hand for footwear

We may need to make some of these, but hopefully not too many. I'm looking for someone who can make and find the footwear we need (Loft, actors, thrift stores, other companies, etc.) and adapt, embellish, distress and/or disguise it appropriately. We will have brocade slippers, boots, soled shoes, etc.

Needs to: do period research from our resources and the Internet (some already done).

Works in collaboration with: costumes.

Original design or creative input: within my overall design; creative input welcome.

3. A lead hand for headwear

We will make some of these, as well as a headpiece for the queen (we have patterns for those). I need someone to handle all of the headwear: either to be able to make it him or herself, or gather the people who can help make/adapt/alter.

Needs to: do period research from our resources and the Internet (some already done).

Works in collaboration with: costumes and hair. Original design or creative input: within my overall design; creative input welcome.

4. A lead hand for makeup

I need someone who can either do it him or herself, or gather the expertise to have it done and supervise that team/group. Elizabeth's makeup, in particular, is crucial to her look, but everyone will need makeup, especially the males dressed for women's roles.

Needs to: do period research from our resources and the Internet (some already done).

Works in collaboration with: costumes.

Original design or creative input: within my overall design; creative input welcome.

The bulk of the work for footwear and headwear will take place between now and May 24^{th} (costume parade), but may continue, if adjustments are needed, until opening (June 8^{th}). Lead hands and helpers will probably not be

expected to participate during the run, although someone from both areas needs to be on call for any repairs or changes that might be required.

For wigs/hair and makeup, the work can now. Lead hands must be prepared to participate in and/or organize crew to handle all dressed rehearsals (probably beginning third week in May) and throughout the run.

I need capable, experienced people who are self-motivating and who can work at an intermediate-to-advanced level. My goal is a large, strong, knowledgeable, diverse team to help carry the load.

A Creative Academic – Hetty Clews



Born in the West Midlands, in Halesowen, **Hetty Upjohn** demonstrated her love of theatre, music and academia from an early age. It was while at the University of Birmingham that a fourth

(and the most significant) love entered her life in the form of **Alan Clews**, a student in the pre-med program. Hetty and Alan met in third-year when both were cast in a university production of *The Insect Play* by **Karel** and **Josef Čapek**. Hetty played the part of a pregnant cricket. Alan was the villainous ichneumon fly who stabs the young mother-to-be and drags her to his lair to provide food for his own multilegged offspring.

Although Alan had fallen for Hetty from the moment he saw her at the auditions, it took a while before he won her over. Their getting together as a couple was handicapped by the fact that in a university with more than one campus, the two young students had few opportunities to bump into one another. However, a couple of months after finishing The *Insect Play*, Hetty and a girlfriend went to the spring ball together, where they ran into Alan and a chum of his (although the girls were not aware of it at the time, it was no accident that the foursome ended up sitting together). Toward the end of the evening, Alan asked if he could take Hetty home. She agreed. She fetched her borrowed stole, combed her hair and smoothed down her long evening dress, then stood at the entrance waiting for her escort to drive up in his MG (or perhaps a Rover or even a Bentley). She heard a faint putt-putt sound, turned to look, and there he was sitting astride a motorized bicycle. Not even a proper motor-bike, and definitely not the Bentley or Rover she was anticipating. However, unfazed by the precarious transportation, Hetty hiked up her skirts and climbed aboard, and thus began a romance that culminated in a marriage that is still going strong after 57 years.

After graduating with a double honours in English and Theology plus a diploma from the School of Music, Hetty began teaching in Yorkshire. Alan, meanwhile, was still working on his medical degree, but he would bike up to visit her as often as he could. In 1953, he became a qualified GP and the two were married. A year later their first child, **Simon**, was born. In Britain, in the 1950's, young men had to do two years national service. Alan was assigned to a military hospital outside London He was offered a promotion but turned it down, and as a result was immediately transferred to Singapore. Had he agreed to sign on for an extra year, Hetty and Simon could have gone with him, but as neither Alan nor Hetty had any liking for army life with its obsessive regard for rank and protocol, it was agreed that Hetty and the family would remain in England while Alan completed his two-year stint. In 1955, while Alan was away, Hetty gave birth to their second child, Alison, who was six months old before she met her father. On his return, Hetty and Alan moved to Manchester to live and work. Everything was wonderful until Anthony Eden declared war on Libya. At that time, the military could call upon Z Reservists -- recently demobilized troops -- to sign up yet again. As a result, in 1956 Alan was recalled to fight in the Suez in a war that both he and Hetty vehemently opposed. Left behind in England with two small children, Hetty went months without any word from her husband. It wasn't until the conflict in Tripoli was almost over that his letters, covered in the censor's black ink, managed to reach her.

In spite of coping on her own with two small children, Hetty did manage to perform in a variety of productions, including **Gilbert** and **Sullivan's** *HMS Pinafore* in which, although noticeably pregnant, she played the part of Josephine. (Possibly the first and last time that character was with child)

After reuniting in England followed by the birth of their third child ,Margaret (Margi), Alan and Hetty decided to emigrate. In response to an advertisement Alan placed in the British Medical Association Journal for a post somewhere in the Commonwealth, Hetty, Alan and the children chose Canada and Rose Valley, Saskatchewan as their new home. Their arrival immediately raised the status of Rose Valley from hamlet to village as its population increased from 596 to 601. Nevertheless, the Clews family still had to deal with the primitive conditions that prevailed in this rural community. The inconvenience of living without proper sewage or running water was offset by the close friendship that developed between Hetty and Alan and Alan's new partner Ian and his wife Barbara.

While living in Saskatchewan, Hetty appeared in several productions both on-stage and in film. The most notable of the latter was *The Visitor*, in which she was cast as the villain. John Wright directed the film that starred Eric Peterson and Pia Shandel. Hetty also acted and directed in Circle in the Centre productions. It was a small theatre-inthe-round with limited seating space. One of the plays she directed was Arthur Kopit's *Oh Dad*,, *Poor Dad Mama's Hung You In the Closet*... with a young Eric Peterson in the leading role.

In 1974 the family moved to Victoria, and Hetty and Alan became immersed in Langham Court Theatre productions. Hetty recalls that her first audition was for *The Three Sisters* and that she lost out to **Angela Henry** who, along with **Marge Bridgeman**, was her first contact in Victoria. Her first role at the Theatre Guild was in *Fallen Angels* in January 1975. She went on to act in *Lloyd George Knew My Father* (February 1976), *The Matchmaker* (September 1977), *Rape of the Belt* (April 1978), *Happy Days* (a **South Island**

Zone Festival production performed at Langham Court in 1981), Joseph Andrews (September 1983), The Club (September 1984), Legacies (June 1986), On Golden Pond (January 1992), Separate Tables (February 1993) and To Grandmother's House We Go (November 1993). As well as acting, Hetty made a name for herself as a director of productions such as The Entertainer (in which she also composed some of the songs), The Little Foxes (November 1976), Uncle Vanya (October 1978), Coffee Lace (April 1980 for the South Island Zone Festival), Ten Times Table (October 1980), Play Strindberg (April 1983 for the South Island Zone Festival then again for the main stage in June 1983), Summer (March 1984), Translations (April 1988), A Nightingale Sang (October 1988), Ring Round the Moon (March 1994) and I Never Sang For My Father (April 1995).

Hetty worked on costumes in several productions and served as Producer on several others. She also served on the Board as a Member-at-Large and as Vice President,. and in the 1974-75 season she edited the newsletter which she named **The Langham Courtier**.

In 1989, Hetty and Alan retired; he from his medical practice and she from teaching English at **UVic**. They moved to Saltspring Island, where both became involved in the **Saltspring Community Theatre**. In 1997, the couple returned to Victoria and to **Langham Court Theatre** where Hetty, in particular, maintains contact with other members of the **Theatre Guild** through **Facebook** as well as taking an active role in **Readers' Theatre** productions.
