

A Clothes Call

The range of characters makes *The Mystery of Edwin Drood* an interesting challenge, and "the play within a play" format (we see a Victorian theatre troupe as themselves as well as the characters they play) makes it more complex than usual.

The costumes encompass the tattered and dirty clothing of opium addicts and street people, through vibrant embellished satins worn by Asian visitors of

indeterminate origin (as the script describes them) to the elaborate Victorian era bustled gowns of satin, lace and silk for the young heroine.

Drood's cast of 25 actors has 48 costumes (28 of these are sewn

from scratch) with over 250 costume pieces, including accessories.

Our costuming crew is made up of the following:

- two costume designers, Diane Madill and Susan Ferguson;
- five sewers: Diane Madill, Susan Ferguson, Erika Schweitzer, Keri Garland, and Naomi Evers; and
- costume assistants: Peta Mackenzie, Pearl Arden, Ned Lemley and his crew, Eileen Bennett and Alton Cole.

Many meters of fabric were donated for this production which helped tremendously with the costume budget. Donors include Pat Montgomery, Berit Kvarnstom and Shelly Gable.







People Who Need People

I am always really impressed with the Langham backstage volunteers. As a director, I experience first hand the hard work and commitment from those individuals who are the essential backbone and support group whose voluntary effort and labour make it all work.

During the rehearsal period, most of the production crew have put in more hours than the actors. These unsung heroes are constantly producing the essential ingredients that are the foundations that enhance the play.

I have noted the many hours that go into creating costume pieces; the process of designing a set blueprint; the talent and skill of the builders. There are weeks of painstaking work that goes into all the fine details. In this particular play, our designer painted many portraits of famous historical characters.

Our props people not only had to find every piece of equipment for a film crew, but also fill the set with old furniture and pieces of antiquity.

The sound designer attended most rehearsals so as to understand exactly what



sound effects were needed, along with all the music for pre-show and intermission required. The designer was also present to support the actors, with their movement and vocal coach, while they rehearsed the songs performed.

As I look at the list of volunteers who hang lights with the lighting designer, I realize that these are the folks I never see because they can only work when the theatre is empty, sometimes late in the night.

There are producers who tirelessly assist the director and cast. There is the

critical job of the stage manager who attends every single rehearsal and who is essentially the boss of the whole and takes the responsibility of the show after opening night. There are ASMs, dressers who are backstage for every performance, along with sound and lighting operators in the booth.

I must not forget the front of house team. This includes the theatre manager and the army of folks who maintain the building, covering box office

and performing technical repairs. There are the people who carry out custodian duties, program coordination, ushering, bartending, and our house manager who welcomes the patrons and announces every show.

At the end of the day, we have a theatre photographer who records every production and those who are involved with the archives.

This legion of diligent collaborators are rarely given credit for all their efforts and I salute you all.



Remembering Sylvia Rhodes

Sylvia Rhodes came to us as an actor in 1975, shortly after arriving in Victoria from England, Calgary, Vancouver and Saskatoon. She has appeared on stage – often in leading roles – in 17 plays at Langham Court Theatre, starting with *The Importance of Being Earnest* in 1976 and was last seen in *The Lady in the Van* in 2011. Sylvia was absent from Langham Court in the late 1970s, when she pursued professional acting, and from 1981 to 1991 when she emigrated to Africa.

Sylvia contributed to Langham Court Theatre in many ways: actor, director, assistant director, producer, co-producer, dialect coach, creator of masks and properties, and set painting. In total, she was actively involved in at least 48 productions.

In addition to Sylvia's work on stage and backstage, she also participated on the Board as Vice President, President and Past President. She was also Production Chair 2004-2006.

Sylvia's Celebration of Life will be held Sunday, February 8 at 2 p.m. at the theatre.

Charlie Aitken: 60, a genial man married to Mattie Fae and hen pecked for 38 years


Little Charles Aitken: 37, socially awkward and clumsy

AGM Report submitted by Monty Bjornson, Vice President



The January 2015 AGM began with a heart-warming tribute to Sylvia Rhodes from our President, Luke Krayenhoff. "She is someone to emulate, and she will be missed dearly."

Highlights from this year's AGM include the following:

- Last year showed a surplus of \$77,528 with ticket revenues of \$268,445 and the average total paid attendance for the 2013/14 season at 82.2%
- Our 2014/15 season is off to a wonderful start with three successful shows under our belt.
- Bartenders are needed! You must have Serving It Right certification. Show comps will be given for this service. If you're interested, contact the box office.
- The Giant Annual Costume Sale made \$4,000 and the loft grossed approximately \$40,000 last year.
- The Costume Guild made \$387 in fabric and notions sale. The Guild has been busy scanning and archiving sewing patterns, and have commenced work on updating the inventory project for the costume loft.

- We have two new Life Members. Congratulations to Sally Crickman and Adam Wilkinson on receiving your life membership and thank you for all of your time and talent that you have given our community.
- John Taylor resigned as Head Scenic Carpenter for health reasons. We are incredibly grateful to John and all of his work!

- Langham has received a new motorized video screen from Camosun College, as well as 12 donated ellipsoidal spotlights, and new power and digital cables from Christie Lites.
- There were two proposed by-law changes, which were approved by the membership:
 - The Production Chairperson has been changed from a two-year term to a three-year term, planning for two seasons (instead of one).
 - If the immediate past President is unable or unwilling to serve, the board may (not must) appoint another past President.
- The board put forward a motion to hire a Production Manager at \$30,000/year and increase ticket prices by \$2 in order to cover this individual's salary. The membership overwhelmingly voted against this proposal and suggested that current staff including the Head Scenic Carpenter and the Technical Director be offered more money in order to fill the position.
- Following the elections of the positions available on the board, the following individuals have been elected:

President - Luke Krayenhoff

Vice President - Montgomery Bjornson

Members at Large (two-year term) – Rosemary Jeffrey and Bill Huzar

Member at Large (one-year term)

– Kevin Stinson

In closing, Luke Krayenhoff summarized the society's year ahead –"We intend to be learning from our mistakes and building on our successes."
