

Victoria Theatre Guild Summer General Meeting and Barbecue

Sunday, July 8th
Meeting 4:00 p.m.
Langham Court Theatre

There will be several brief reports, and then the main business of the meeting will be deciding if the Guild membership supports the Board's proposal to change our current system of electing/acclaiming a Production Chair at each SGM to a system of appointing an Artistic Director (see the Strategic Planning information in the May newsletter.)

If the proposal is supported, there will be no need to select a new Planning Production Chairperson at the SGM. If the proposal is <u>not</u> supported, then a new Planning Production Chair will need to be selected at the SGM, as usual. Your voice and opinion are very important – please plan to attend this meeting and make your vote count.

In Brief - Under the proposed plan, as the Board is the body charged with the responsibilities of the Guild's operation, the Artistic Director would be appointed/removed by the Board (rather than elected by the membership) and required to attend Board meetings but would not have voting privileges. This would mean decreasing the size of the Board by two voting positions (Planning and Active Production Chairpersons) or adding two more Members-at-large to continue the current number of voting positions.

Details of the changes that would be required to our by-laws, if the proposal is supported, will be posted separately on our website or available at the theatre by June 8th.

The barbecue will follow the meeting.

The bar will be open.

Please bring something to barbecue and a potluck item to share.

Notice to Members of A Special Resolution at the Summer General Meeting

At the Summer General Meeting, to be held on Sunday, July 8th at 4 p.m., at **Langham Court Theatre**, a **Special Resolution** will be put forward to the membership, subject to the condition noted below, to revise the current bylaws of the **Victoria Theatre Guild and Dramatic School** by removing the elected Board positions of Active and Planning Production Chairpersons and replacing those positions with an Artistic Director who is appointed by the Board and will serve ex officio.

Note that prior to the Special Resolution being put forward, there will be a discussion about the intention and logistics of the proposed changed to an Artistic Director model, and the Special Resolution will **only** be put forward to the membership if the membership supports the proposed change.

The proposed text of the changes to the Bylaws, should the change to an Artistic Director be supported, together with a tracked changes version (showing changes from the present bylaws) will be available to all members beginning June 8th, 2012.

To avoid unnecessary mailing costs, as of **Friday**, **June 8**th, **2012**, if you wish to obtain a copy of the proposed changes to the Bylaws to review, please do one of the following:

a) drop by the theatre to obtain one from the Box Office;

On June 8th, notice will be emailed to all members on the theatre's email distribution list advising that the proposed changes have been finalised and reminding members of the three ways to obtain a copy.

A Few Facts and Figures

Looks like this year's season holds the distinction of bottom 3 plays ever and 4 in the bottom 8 (out of a total of 120 plays), and the No 1 play (also the most expensive and most Equity members in the cast). This 2011-2012 season in total is also likely to be the worst overall average in the past 20 years.

Audience who Paid for Tickets

The **Langham Court Theatre** paying audience has declined by 20.2% from 85.2% in 2005-2006 to an estimated 65 percent for this season. (The Foreigner is estimated at 75 percent).

At current ticket prices, the difference between an 85 percent season and a 65 percent represents a loss in revenue of about \$50,000 a year. Each 1percent is about \$2,500.

Finances

It is really hard to describe financial stuff without lots of "if this" and " if you don't include that" etc. However, some of the the basic issues seem to be:

- 1. Audience attendance has gone down in 5 of the past 6 years. Crashed by 8 percent this season.
- 2. The Guild is dependent on grants and donations to pay its way. The accounts indicate that the Guild has spent more than it has earned over the past four years even including grants and donations. (With the exception of the \$100,000 bequest from **Jack Droy**.)
- 3. Grants and donations are uncertain, as the cancellation of the Bingo grant showed. So it is risky to depend on them to pay for operating the theatre.
- 4. Operating costs have increased by \$30,000-\$40,000 a year or about 20 percent over the past four years. Revenues have stayed fairly flat despite price increases.
- 5. It's difficult to see how the number of shows in a season or the number of performances per show can be much increased.
- 6. "Staff" payments may increase next year. This will add to operating costs.
- 7. Ticket prices increased last year. Will another increase next year bring in more revenue?
- 8. There is a long-term plan in progress. Will it lead to short term expectations to spend on costly renovations/improvements?

Fortunately, there is cash in the bank which usually is at minimum \$100,000 at the financial year end (Aug 31st) to meet commitments, cash flow and uncertainties for the next season. Also there is a \$100,000 bequest by **Jack Droy**. If current audience trends continue without grants and/or donations, the available funds will be depleted. Big renovations in the near future could be a risky venture.

5 years ago the Finance Committee at the time prepared a set of guidelines. They are summarised below:

- 1. Don't spend more than you earn.
- 2. Save surpluses (profits) until matching grants are available for renovations.
- 3. Budget to make a profit every year and stick to the budget.

And without making any artistic judgements, I add my own:

4. Pick plays that audiences are willing to pay to see.

A Langham Court History Lesson Letters From Concerned Members

To the Board of Control:

On Thursday May 10th I spent 3 hours up in the Archives at the University of Victoria. I photocopied important aspects of the following:

Sylvia Rhodes (then Hatchman), Toshik (then Tony) Bukowiecki, Angela Henry, Hetty Clews, Antoinette Church, Ginny Carter, Graham Thompson, Rube Price (deceased), Mary Jane Scott (deceased), Mary Jane Lewis, Denis Johnston, were some of the people involved in what happened 35 years ago, in 1977 and 1978. Before this period, the season was chosen by The Board.

On February 14th 1977, **Hetty Clews** was President, and she recommended that the Production Chair **not** be someone on the Board, so **Mary Jane Lewis** was appointed. She resigned rather quickly, and then **Hetty** resigned, but was persuaded to come back. So **Sylvia** was appointed the Production Chair, and I have a copy of a letter of resignation she wrote on October 3rd, 1977. She resigned as Vice President, Membership Chair and

"Production Chair". Please note this all took place in 8 months.

The Board appointed Production Chairs, who resigned or were "let go," etc. **Mary Jane Lewis** was appointed by **Mary Jane Scott**, even though Hetty was President.

Helen Smith appointed Tony (Toshik) Bukowiecki, Denis Johnston, Sylvia Hatchman (Rhodes). Then Hetty resigned again. It goes on and on, it is angry, vicious stuff and quite a lot of important things are missing.

For those of you newer Board members, if you are confused by any names, please ask Sylvia or Toshik. (I had recently arrived in Victoria in 1977, and had just started acting at Langham Court. Although I remember there was great concern about my desire to direct *The Killing of Sister George*, or *The Children's Hour* (both plays about Lesbians – why I'm not sure!), eventually I did direct both of those

plays, **after** the Production Chair became an "elected" position).

There was no record of the AGM of 1978, but I am sure that was when **Rube Price** had the constitution amended to ensure a Production Chair was another Board Member to be elected by the membership.

Suddenly, at the AGM of 15th January 1979, **Rube Price** was elected **by the membership** as Production Chair. Before the elections, **Tony Bukowiecki** had been chosen by **the Board** to be the Production Chair.

Rube stayed in that position for at least **three** years, voted **by** the Membership. **Mary Jane Scott** succeeded Rube, but resigned in 1983 due to ill health. **Adrian Jarvis** then became Production Chair. Since that time, the P.C. was elected by the membership at the January Meetings. An improvement came when the P.C. was elected at the June meeting, giving the P.C. more time to finalise a season and Directors.

I am deeply concerned to read about planned changes in the latest newsletter re. The Production Chair.

This new proposition is **not new**. It is 35 years old, and it didn't work the first time.

I have spoken to Sylvia and Angela, but their memories are vague. Well, so are mine; after all, it was 35 years ago. We are not a "regional" theatre, we are a community theatre. I will be sending this letter to the newsletter. I am also emailing it to all my addresses. I am considering putting it on my Facebook page. I am asking you all to re-think and reconsider what you are proposing.

Has anyone considered a Production Chair be elected for two years as are other Board members now?

My love for **Langham Court Theatre**, the past, the present and the future, is deep. I treasure the friends I have made, the work I have done, and the young people all coming in to take over from us.

This is as it should be!

(On another point, the words Artistic Director do not apply to a community theatre. An Artistic Director is a paid position that must be applied for, complete with C.V., recommendations, interviews etc. for a professional theatre company.)

Letter to the Board of Langham Court Theatre:

As a long-time member of **Langham Court Theatre** and a Life Member, I would like to respond to the suggestion in the May Newsletter that the Production Chair be replaced by an Artistic Director for a term of two years. To be voted on at the upcoming summer AGM.

The suggestion is that this would 'allow us to plan more ambitious productions' and enable us to have a 'greater consistency in the type of productions we offer our patrons.'

My first question is: Why change a play selection process that has worked extremely well for the last 34 years?'

Does the phrase 'more ambitious productions' mean large royalties and production expenses? I am not against exciting productions; however, I am concerned about overly expensive productions and their impact on the financial security of the theatre. According to the theatre's accounts, for the last three years, more money has been going out than has been coming in (not taking into account the bequest from **Jack Droy**).

Having worked on many **Langham Court** productions, as a producer and in other production capacities, it is my

opinion that **Langham Court Theatre** is already stretched to its limit in terms of manpower and funds. The same people get asked to work on shows over and over again, often leading to burnout and frustration. Almost everyone who works on a production is a volunteer. More ambitious productions means a greater demand for volunteer input.

What does 'greater consistency mean'? Is this an artistic or financial issue?

We are a community theatre, we are not a professional theatre or a regional theatre; therefore we depend on our volunteers to make the theatre function. We draw our volunteers from the membership; therefore, it is vital that they have a say in choosing the person who will be selecting the plays that they will be asked to work on. The Board of Control decides on most aspects of the running of the theatre. Do not take away the one opportunity the membership have to contribute to the life of their theatre. Do not take away the uniqueness that is **Langham Court Theatre.**
