

From November 21st to December 8th, during the run of *Lady Windermere's Fan*, the featured artist will be **Dawn Joy Ritchie**. If you wish to meet the artist, Dawn Joy will be in the lounge on Sunday, November 25th from 1:00 to 3:00 p.m.

She loves to create happy art to make you smile and laugh.

She never thought she could draw until the year 2001, when for some inexplicable reason she closed her eyes to attempt to draw a cat. When she opened her eyes, she erased and connected the lines and a simple cat face was staring back at her. She then painted the drawing with watercolour. From that moment on, animals starting popping out of her subconscious and within 6 months she had 40 animal images. They seemed to have the will to be born and she was just the channel.

Her passion is to create new and innovative characters. Working from imagination gives her incredible freedom. She relies on intuition and it continues to amaze her the abundance of images that come very quickly. Never in her wildest dreams did she think she could become an artist. It feels like a miracle. She believes if she can become an artist, anyone can. "We all have creativity within us just waiting to manifest. It's just a matter of giving yourself permission, removing all judgement, and allowing the creativity to flow unimpeded."

Born in Glasgow, Scotland, Dawn Joy is a self-taught artist who creates unique, whimsical, and colourful images with a childlike simplicity. She enjoys working in acrylic on canvas, paper collage, and digital media. Dawn Joy is a juried member who shows with the Federation of Canadian Artists (FCA) and the Island Illustrators Society (IIS). Her artwork has been licensed for advertising and conferences. Original paintings are in collections in Canada, USA, England, Scotland, Germany, and New Zealand. She has a retail and wholesale line of greeting cards, fridge magnets, buttons, and prints. 

The Board and Langham Court regret to announce the retirement of **Bill Adams** as our Head Scenic Carpenter. We wish to thank him for his excellent work over the past 15 seasons and hope he enjoys his new-found freedom. However, we now need to find a replacement to be our new Head Carpenter. Bill has generously offered to remain in place until the end of *The 39 Steps* (March 6^{th} , 2013) and is willing to mentor the successful volunteer.

We need someone with the following traits and qualifications.

Personality Traits

- o Equanimity keeping a positive outlook.
- o Gentle assertiveness building and maintaining respect from and for others.
- o Ability to assess the skills and qualities of volunteers and maximizing their potential.

Job Qualifications

- o Design, drafting and graphics skills.
- Carpentry skills: general and theatre set construction, finish carpentry and some practical furniture building experience.
- Familiarity with the tools and techniques of the set building trade.
- Supervisory skills specifically working with production teams and overseeing the effective, timely, and safe completion
 of the set for each production. This includes ordering materials, preparation of working drawings, scheduling, teaching
 set building techniques to volunteers and members, acting as head stage carpenter, assisting and supervising others in
 stage carpentry.
- Shop management: including shop maintenance; tool maintenance and acquisition; inventory management; materials management: estimation and ordering.
- o Ability to work with theatre directors and set designers (Attend production meetings for each production and advise on set design and construction and related costs).
- O Attend each production strike to ensure that the set is properly dismantled, and nothing of value leaves the theatre, and return the stage area to the same condition it was in prior to the production.
- o General painting skills: materials, tools, and methods (including an understanding of colour mixing).
- o A real bonus in any candidate would be the ability to do faux painting, backgrounds and murals.
- Effective networking experience within the theatre community (to facilitate support, tool and material loans, acquisitions etc.).
- o Problem-solving ability: creative solutions to set-building/design challenges.

While this is a part-time volunteer position, it can require considerable time commitments before and during set construction. Bill estimates typical time requirement for productions can be between 100 and 126 hours, and has traditionally been done from 9:00 a.m. to 1:00 p.m. Monday through Friday:

- o Planning and materials acquisitions: 8 to 10 hours per show.
- Set building and volunteer supervision: 80 to 90 hours per show.
- Set painting: 8 to 12 hours per show.
- o Call outs during show runs: 6 to 8 hours per production.
- O Set strike and supervision: 5 to 6 hours per show.

The position comes with honorarium of \$1000 per show. 

Here Comes "The Fan"









Angela Henry and her cast of 24 are hard at work preparing Lady Windermere's Fan, the next play of the season.

This **Oscar Wilde** play is set in London in the late 1890s where a lady's fan, left in a man's rooms, would signal a social death for a "good woman." Wilde loves to poke fun at the strident rules that govern London high society at the end of the 19th century. His acerbic commentary leaves nothing untouched. The play draws our attention to everything from marriage to dyed hair. The behaviour was bad and the dress was nothing less than spectacular. And, as Mrs. Erlynne says: "If a woman really repents, she has to go to a bad dressmaker ... and nothing in the world would induce me to do that."

So, of course, the dynamic duo of **Diane Madill** and **Susan Ferguson** took that line to heart. These talented costume designers are creating the most amazing suits and gowns with such lavish and sumptuous detail that Angela was prompted to say to her actors, "You better ramp up your performance because no one is looking at your face." Be prepared for a feast of the eyes. Some of the 12 ball gowns and 5 suits are so labour intensive that Di estimates easily 100 hours per dress. Each gown takes 7 metres of cloth. Di and Susan are assisted in this arduous task by designers **Trish Macdonald**, **Brighde Penn** and **Ann Marie Arneson**. The result of this labour of love from these women is a wonderful period addition to the costume holdings of the theatre. Here is a sneak preview of the detail of the gown. Sally Crickman did an amazing job dressing the set and **Jean de Cartier** worked hard in sorting out all the hand props; and it was **Sally** along with **Sylvia Rhodes** and **Vinnie Chadwick** who cut, sanded and painted the endless books - on top of all the other good work they did.

I think it turned out to be a good set – one that I'm proud of as designer, head carpenter and head painter – and I want to thank all these folks for their invaluable help in getting it ready in time for tech weekend.

The play is a comedic homage to a 1930s Britain of cold mists, steam engines, and a clearly demarcated social system where people know their place. At its centre, juxtaposed with the comedy, is the story of a man's personal quest to find self-fulfillment. The story is a classic portrayal of a wrongly accused man's flight from the authorities as he is pursued through a series of improbable adventures. Finally, he finds true love with the woman to whom is he handcuffed, the real villains are exposed, and our hero is vindicated.

Steven Sanders: mid to late 30s - 40s. Handsome. Impeccable manners. Very controlled with little or no expression. Surface charm. Manipulative. Smug. A deadly and violent side to his nature.

Charlotte Thornton: 35-45 years. Actress. Glamorous. Hard-edged. Party girl. Has a reputation for being a bit of a seductress.

Interactive Play Brings Ghosts of Plaza Hotel To Life

This November, windy autumn nights give way to haunting tales of an historic hotel and its checkered past. *Ghosts of the Plaza*, funded in part by the Greater Victoria Spirit Committee, is a series of one-act vignettes taken from the history of the controversial Victoria Plaza Hotel. The play tells the story of the hotel through the eyes of the women who lived and worked there, and the ghosts who have inevitably collected there. Produced by Rosie Bitts' Best Bitts Productions, the project is the brain child of artists Sarah Smith and Sadie Forbes, who believe there is more than meets the eye with the dishevelled hotel. Lead artist Smith, once an employee of the hotel, says: "For years I ventured deep into the building's bowels which I can only liken to the Titanic, lying undiscovered beneath the sea. Just as with the Titanic, there was evidence buried there that time had preserved a long-forgotten space, but once we dug under the surface, the lore of the Plaza's true and remarkable history emerged."

Since 1910, the building standing at 1415 Government Street has elicited moments of both grandeur and the grotesque. True stories of suicide, suspense, and the supernatural come to life alongside the narrative of the eclectic hotel and its numerous reinventions. In celebrating Victoria's 150th year, performances will take place at The **Oddfellows Hall** at 1315 Douglas Street, re-enacted as the haunted hotel. The interactive production will move between rooms where the audience can "step into" the various eras significant to the building's timeline, such as its Prohibition Speakeasy, or its stint as an Arabian Nights themed hotel. Shows run twice nightly: 7:30 p.m. and 9:30 p.m. Friday, November 16th and 23rd and Saturday, November 17th and 24th, plus Saturday matinees on November 17th and 24th at 4:30 p.m. For further information go to:

Roger Carr – fresh from entertaining packed houses as Frank Doel in Langham Court's 84, Charing Cross Road – is taking on directorial duties for a brand new theatrical adaptation of George Orwell's dystopian love story, 1984. Carr is very excited about the project: "(It's) a challenge to turn this enigma into something that works for an audience"

With the year 1984 having long ago flowed from the future into the past, this new work has evolved into 1.9.8.4. (One Nine Eight Four) thereby freeing it from being tied down to one particular time. And that's not the only update, the

play now being set in Victory City – a reimagining of our very own Victoria. Yet the tortured soul and cold heart of Orwell's tale still retains its strong and steady beat. The passing of years having done nothing to diminish its overarching theme: Power Corrupts... Big Brother will most certainly be watching.

Joining Roger in his latest adventure are a number of other highly regarded Langham Courtiers: Stage Manager, Sylvia Lindstrom; Actress, Christine Karpiak; Lighting & Sound Designer, Chad Laidlaw; Playwright, David Elendune. As the rehearsal process gets underway, Carr is

increasingly enthused by the venture: "... it's a super script and I think it works very nicely... (and) we have cast well." Roger sees this new interpretation as a completely collaborative process and is looking forward to co-creating a piece of theatre that will not only engage audiences and make them think but one which will attract less-frequent play-goers and further encourage them to make a habit of coming to see productions regularly.
