## The New Seats Project

(or, the New Seats, Renovated and Safety Improved Auditorium, and Renovated Hallway Project)

Anyone who has been involved in a renovation knows how the scope of the work can mushroom far beyond what was originally planned. Our work this summer at the theatre has done just that!

What started out as a plan to simply replace our seats evolved into a complete face-lift for the auditorium and then the adjoining hallway.

## Here's what's happened:

We started off by removing the brass plaques from our old seats and labelling each with their row and seat number. Next came the removal of the old aisle carpets – a truly disgusting and filthy job! Then we started removing the old seats. I am very happy to tell you that the only seats that we junked were the approximately ten broken or incomplete ones. The rest went to new homes and will continue to be used. **Tim Gosley**, son of **Gerry Gosley** who produced the *Smile Show* at **Langham Court Theatre** for years in the 60's, has taken 50 seats for the theatre in his house on Fairfield Road. The Events Centre has taken 40 seats, numerous people have taken one or more seats and the rest were purchased during our Yard Sale on July 3<sup>rd</sup>. It is gratifying to know that they haven't become part of Hartland Landfill.

We decided to move the light fixtures from the hallway into the auditorium to increase our houselights and replaced the fixtures in the hallway with track lights. To improve the look of the track-lit hallway, we decided to paint the walls above the track lights black. During that discussion, someone, who will remain blameful, started picking one of the many Velcro tabs off the wall which led to someone else doing likewise and before we knew it, the walls looked diseased. As there was no going back, we had no choice but to remove all the Velcro tabs, clean up and repaint the whole hallway. It may not have been part of the original plan but the change is extreme and wonderful! The hallway no longer feels like a cavern and the new lighting not only illuminates it better but makes it much

easier to see and enjoy the photo displays. Once the old seats were removed, the wobbly stair railings were removed and the auditorium floor got new layers of plywood and hardboard added to provide a good solid surface for the new seats. The house-light fixtures and some defunct ventilation fixtures were removed; the ceiling was patched, then painted. Then the rest of the auditorium was painted as well. New railings were built (the building may fall down but the railings will stand forever!). The houselights were re-installed, as was the wiring for the aisle and stair lights. The floor got three coats of paint, and we were ready for the new seats!

The work of installing the seats, re-carpeting and finishing the electrical work will all be done by tradespeople so the volunteer portion of our reno has been completed, and I ask you to join me in thanking the following people for volunteering their time, elbow-grease and expertise:

## New Bylaws For Langham Court Theatre

At the Summer General Meeting on June 27, 2010, the **Victoria Theatre Guild** passed a special resolution to repeal its existing bylaws in their entirety and replace them with a new set of bylaws. The proposed new bylaws were made available to the membership before the SGM, in accordance with the advanced notice requirements for special resolutions. Interestingly, the last set of bylaws recognized by the **Registrar of Societies** were the 1987 bylaws, therefore what the membership voted to repeal was actually the 1987 bylaws.

For the information of all members, here is a brief outline of the major changes in the new bylaws. Please note that not all of the detailed changes have been outlined here; the minutes of the SGM contain more details about changes and the discussion, and as soon as the bylaws have been accepted by the **Registrar of Societies**, they will be available at the Theatre for anyone who is interested. This is a "Coles Notes" version, if you will.

#### General Notes/Changes:

- Language: The new bylaws use modern, simpler language in an effort to make them more user-friendly. Legalese has been reduced, passive voice changed to active, etc.
- Membership Categories: There is now just one category of membership the previous distinctions were distinctions without a difference, so were unnecessary (Junior and Senior members did not have different privileges, and fees are based on different criteria).
- 4<sup>th</sup> Member at Large Position: The Junior Coordinator position on the Board has been changed into a 4<sup>th</sup> Member at Large. It was felt that identifying this member of the Board as 'Junior' created an artificial distinction between junior and adult, and efforts to ensure involvement of younger people would be better handled by the Education Committee.
- Membership Fees: Since membership fees are now due for everyone on January for the calendar year, the bylaws have been changed to reflect that.
- · Elections:
- Nominations Chair A Nominations Chair was
  previously appointed for the elections at the AGM, and
  the Secretary handled elections at the SGM. A
  Nominations Chair will now be appointed for both the
  AGM and SGM; it could be the Secretary, but doesn't
  have to be. Also, the Nominations Chair was given

the discretion to create a Committee if he or she wants but it is no longer mandatory.

Board Terms – Terms for Board Members have been changed from one year terms to two year terms, starting in January 2011. Four Members of the Board will begin their two year term as of January 2011 (President, Vice-President, 2 Members at Large) and the remaining four (Treasurer, Secretary, other 2 Members at Large) will begin their two year term as of January 2012, thereby increasing continuity and consistency by always having some experienced Board Members. January 2011 will be a transition year – 4 Board Members elected for two year terms, 4 Board Members elected for one year terms.

- Committees: Several committees have been removed (House Management, Play Assessment, Maintenance, Operations, Rentals, Season Vouchers), since they were listed as "mandatory" and had not been in use for some time, or their responsibilities had been subsumed by the General Manager. New committees can be created or recreated at any time.
- Duties/Responsibilities of Staff/Contractors:

  Previous versions of the bylaws spelled out the duties/responsibilities of the staff/contractors. These details are set as a matter of contract law between the Victoria Theatre Guild and the contractors, so it wasn't correct to put them in the bylaws. Now the bylaws merely list the possible contracted positions and details of duties and responsibilities will be set out in their contracts as established by the Personnel Committee and approved by the Board.

As a result of discussion at the SGM, a new clause was added to the bylaws to specifically recognize that, in addition to supervising the selection of plays to recommend to the Board for the next season, the **Planning Production Chairperson** is also then responsible for selecting the directors for the season of plays that has been approved by the Board.

**The Special Resolution**, "be it resolved that the entire text of the current Bylaws of the Victoria Theatre Guild and Dramatic School be repealed and replaced with the new version as amended by the Society at the Summer General Meeting on June 27, 2010", was moved by **Karrie Wolfe** and seconded by **Bill Adams**, and carried unanimously.

I would like to thank all those who took the time to read and provide comments on the bylaws throughout the course of this project. In particular, my thanks to Committee members **Evan Roberts**, **Mike Miller** and **John Gilliland**; to **Lisa Leighton** and **Sylvia Lindstrom** for eagle-eyed editing and polishing; and to Roger Carr, Fran Patterson and Toshik Bukowiecki for meeting with me

directly on behalf of the Board.

#### Personnel Changes To Take Effect August 1st

Those members who attended the Summer General Meeting will already be aware that **Craig Mracek** will not be returning as our General Manager once his contract is completed July 31. (Not that he will be away from the theatre for very long; he is already busy doing lighting design for *Odd Couple*.) The Board of Directors, and I'm sure the membership in general, wish Craig the best of luck in every endeavour, and especially in his goal of working for a charitable organization overseas within the next year.

**Denise Brown**, our present Box Office Manager, will take on the role of Theatre Manager as of August 1<sup>st</sup>, combining the duties of box office management and administration. We've all become familiar with Denise's smiling face in the box office, and the Board is delighted to have her taking on this position. We owe Craig, Denise, **Dick Newson**, and their small group of very hard-working box office volunteers, many thanks for their countless hours of work in the computerization and reorganization of the box office.

## Oscar Wilde's Masterpiece Performed at Craigdarroch Castle

## Introducing our newest Life Member: Web-Master Kai Hansen

For the past ten years **Kai Hansen** has been maintaining, improving, enhancing **Langham Court Theatre's** image on the World Wide Web. According to Kai, who takes his role as Web-Master seriously, it takes a minimum of 200 hours a year to keep the website up to date and user friendly.

Not always glued to the computer, Kai comes from Copenhagen where he grew up a mere ten minutes away from the **Dyrehavs Bakken** amusement park, an ideal hangout for an adventurous young boy. Between the ages of ten and fourteen, Kai practically lived at the park, working as crew for **Kramer's Variety Show**. Also, being so young, he was the park's mascot and was able to go on the rides as much as he wanted. He recalls doing 40 turns on the large wooden roller coaster in one day. At age fifteen and sixteen, Kai spent his summer holidays gofering for the **Circus Marino**.

In between his life at the **Dyrehavs Bakken** and the **Circus Marino**, Kai went to a school that he remembers as having an extremely beautiful theatre. Built in 1949, the school and its theatre still look as attractive and up-to-date as they did then. Kai remembers his first acting role at age seven as Princess Golden Locks. He suffered a lot of teasing for his art but in later roles, due to his height, he was able to play the bad guys and in one Danish play he was even required to smoke on stage.

Language was always an important aspect of Kai's life. He learned to read fluently when very young, and it was this ability that ensured that he was regularly called upon to read poetry and to act in school plays. He also gained fluency in English through the written word. At age twelve his choice of English reading was **Mad Magazine**.

After high school, Kai joined the **Danish Air Force** and was stationed in the Faroe Islands for more than three

years doing ice patrols. He was part of the crew required to map the location of icebergs then radio the coordinates to the shipping lines, a task now done by satellite. It was while he was in the Air Force that Kai developed his love of flying.

In 1971, Kai moved to Zimbabwe (then called Rhodesia) for seven years to work for **Dunlop Tires** in Bulawaio. By that time, according to Kai, there was no apartheid and no English civil servants in Southern Rhodesia. From Zimbabwe, Kai and his family moved to Canada. First stop was Calgary where he remained until 1995. It was during that time that Kai became a clown – literally. A community centre near his home needed someone to dress up in clown costume for some celebration. Kai volunteered and **Dizzy the Clown** was born. Six weeks later Kai joined a course in clowning led by Nadine **Rogers**. This was followed by a second course then a week at **Clown University** held at La Crosse Wisconsin as part of the **University of Wisconsin**. He learned about props and characterization from some of the best clowns from the U.S. and the U.K. **Dizzy the clown** was a regular entertainer at the **Calgary Stampede** and when the **Grey Cup** match came to town, Dizzy was there to help make the celebrations go with a bang. As a clown, Kai became proficient at making balloon animals, and he remembers that on one occasion working a line-up of children, he made 849 animals in one afternoon – that's a lot of work, those balloons are hard to inflate.

At age 52, Kai retired from his job in Calgary and moved to Victoria and branched out into a brand new field. It was at this time that he began acquiring the necessary skill and computer savvy to create websites. In no time at all, Kai was web-master for a number of volunteer organisations and it was around this time, approximately ten years ago, that Kai met Sylvia Rhodes at a Penninsula Players gathering. They discussed the possibility of creating a website for the Victoria Theatre Guild. Shortly after, Kai met with Toshik Bukowiecki and Bonnie Groening and the website became a reality, with Bonnie acting as liaison between Kai and the theatre. When Peta MacKenzie became General Manager, she and Kai worked together to improve the web-site and again more changes and more improvements occurred when Kai began working with Craig Mracek.

Kai maintains that he has learned a lot and that he has enjoyed being **Langham Court's** Web-Master but is ready to move on to a more active life now he has recovered from an illness that left him hospitalised and forced to lie flat on

his back for a month in 2008. However, he will never lose his connection with Langham Court and with theatre in general. After all, he comes from a family that has jealously guarded season tickets to the Royal Theatre in Copenhagen for 150 years. It seems that the only way to get season tickets to the Royal Theatre is to inherit them or to wait for up to 15 years on the off chance that some become available. Kai's family have the tickets they obtained from his wife's great aunt. Those tickets are now in his sister's possession and will be handed down to his nephew. So, with a family history so closely linked to the arts, it is no surprise that Kai has been, and will continue to be a supporter of theatre in general and of Langham Court in particular.
