He was also a member of **Stage Left**, the Company that produced *Paper Wheat* at the **Belfry Theatre** in 1982, and he directed, wrote, and performed in a one-man show on Clarence Darrow.

Vic was a vibrant member of the Victoria theatre community and will be greatly missed.

# Our very own Song and Dance team -- Marge Bridgeman and Ginny Carter

Every company needs a good song and dance team and ours is one of the best. Both **Marge Bridgeman** and **Ginny Carter** have had ample opportunity on **Langham Court's** stage to show us how to put across a good routine.

#### Marge Bridgeman

Practically born in a trunk, Marge first started in theatre as a child acrobat and dancer before becoming a student with the legendary Italia Conti. This was followed by several years working in pantomimes in London's West End where she was frequently called upon to show her legs as a principal boy in such roles as Prince Charming in Cinderella and Dick in Dick Whittington and His Cat. Marge then moved to Canada and, fortunately for us, to Victoria where in 1963 she became a member of Langham Court Theatre. In her first production, Under the Yum-Yum Tree, Marge played the female lead, Irene Wilson. She also worked with Bastion Theatre, St. Luke's Players, VOS, and in the 1960's and 1970's she starred in Butchart Gardens' summer shows.

Her roles for the Victoria Theatre Guild included Jane Banbury in *Fallen Angels*, Mrs. Wicksteed in *Habeas Corpus*, Edna Shaft in *Butley*, Madame Dubonnet in *The Boy Friend*, Lady Alice More in *A Man For All Seasons* and Madame Arcati in *Blithe Spirit*.

Marge has also been active behind the scenes as producer and co-producer on a variety of shows as well as painting sets, working on décor, and co-ordinating costumes. She was also on the Membership Committee during the seventies and early eighties and was one of the team that conceived the idea of regular membership or club nights. In January 1982 the newly elected Board appointed Marge to chair that committee and to start putting the committee's ideas into effect. At the same time Marge was voted in as Member-at-Large, a position she held until 1984. In the early nineties she volunteered to become House Manager while husband Len took over management of the bar. During that time Marge worked with a team to develop a Front of House

Manual. At the same time, she put together a report outlining her recommendations for improvements to the lounge - a report that was acted upon when the lounge and coffee- room were renovated two years later in 1994.

Marge may not be as active in Guild affairs at present but she can still strut her stuff on stage as her appearance as one of the Topsys in *Waiting in the Wings* proved all too well.

#### **Ginny Carter**

Ever since she played Red Riding Hood's Grandmother at age six, Ginny has been cast in character roles both in Calgary where she worked professionally with **Betty Mitchell's** company and here in Victoria where she has worked with both the **Victoria Theatre Guild** and **VOS**.

Although Ginny came back to Victoria from Calgary during the early sixties, her involvement with Langham **Court** did not begin until 1975. It was then she first appeared on our stage as Jessie in *The Prisoner of 2<sup>nd</sup>* Avenue. This was followed in 1977 by roles in The Birds, Look Homeward Angel, and The Matchmaker. In 1978 Ginny appeared as Mrs. Garnet in *Out of the Frying Pan* and Marina in *Uncle Vanya*. Two years later, in 1980, she starred, along with Lina de Guevera, in Coffee Lace, the Victoria Theatre Guild entry in the SVI Drama Festival. Both Ginny and Lina won awards for their performances in that production. In 1982 the two were teamed up again in the Kevin Land play Turns, which was later adapted for **CHEK TV** with Lina and Ginny reprising their leading roles. Ginny was also Mrs Potts in the 1983 production of *Picnic*. And the following year the versatile actress played the tap-dancing bellboy in the all-female production of **The Club**.

Like Marge, Ginny was as active behind the scenes as she was on stage. She painted scenery, worked on set décor, produced, and served on the Board as a Member At Large for several seasons. While on the board, she was appointed membership chair and also assisted **Maggie**  Hall in the box office. In 1981 Ginny had the great idea of offering a special rate for Season Tickets (six for the price of five). That was the same year that she, along with Marge Bridgeman, worked to get the Membership Club Nights underway. And like Marge Bridgeman, Ginny was also one of the Topsys in Waiting in The Wings. However, her most recent performance on our stage was at the Christmas Party where she had the entire gathering in floods of tears with her heartfelt rendition of "Send in the Clowns".

### We Got Mail . . .

An interesting thing happened as a result of the contents of your last newsletter. You included some info and photographs of the previous two **LCT** productions of *Picnic*. And although they were of interest to many, the inclusion of the photos was met with great dismay by **Dan Thachuk**, the set designer of our current production. You see, designers don't like to be seen copying other designs. They like to come up with their own, fresh concept. Dan never saw the photos of the previous shows prior to the commencement of construction of this show, and when he saw them, his immediate thought was," Oh God, they look so much like my design, people reading the newsletter will think that I copied the old designs." Had he seen those photos, (had he know that they even existed) he would have deliberately made his design different.

I tend to agree with Dan. I was dismayed as well for the very same reasons, although it wasn't my design. I could completely empathize with him after those photos appeared.

I know it was an interesting piece of research and on the surface, an interesting thing to include in the newsletter. But in the future, if we do a show that has been done at **Langham Court** previously, I would like to request, on behalf of the set designers, that you do not include photos of prior sets in the Newsletter – at least until after the show comes down. Photos of the actors that don't show the set would be totally fine.

I noticed in the latest *Langham Court Newsletter* that you are developing a list of people who have been associated with the **Victoria Theatre Guild** and have gone on to work professionally in performing arts.

In case you haven't already included her in the list, I'd like to mention **Amanda Lisman**. Over the past year or so, she was cast as the female lead in *Pride and Prejudice* production of the **Citadel Theatre** in Edmonton, and during the 2009 **Stratford Festival** season she was cast by the Stratford organisation in their 2009 productions of *Cyrano de Bergerac* (opposite **Colm Feore**), *Macbeth* and *Zastrozzi*.

## Sewers and Costume Designers Tea

On Sunday, November 22, more than a dozen sewers and costume designers met in the lounge to view the theatre's new and newly organized pattern resources, and to talk about ideas for workshops and a formal costumers' group.



We welcomed newcomers Laura Torbet, Colette Cole, Diane Whyte and Chris Stusek (costume designer for the VOS' production of *Gypsy*), and welcomed back Christine Shiner, Ann Marie Arneson (who assisted Chris on Gypsy), Toshik Bukowiecki, Susan Ferguson, Lynn Cadrain, Lara Eichhorn, Di Madill and Jean de Cartier. Hot drinks and delicious potluck treats made the rain and wind outside disappear for a couple of hours.



Throughout the afternoon there was a computer slide show of part of the **Commercial Pattern Archive (CoPA)** pattern collection. As reported in the November newsletter, the theatre now owns three CDs that contain a large portion of the **CoPA's** extensive pattern collection, dating back to 1868. One part of the presentation was an introduction to the **CoPA** resource and a brief tutorial on how the search program works. The CD set – which is an extraordinary education in itself in everything from silhouettes to colours, fabrics, shoes, hats and hairstyles – is now available, with an instruction manual, for any of our sewers and designers to sign out. While this electronic archive is a view- and print-only resource, scans of the pattern pieces are included for almost all of the entries, so anyone who knows how to draft patterns could replicate these designs.



Everyone was also keenly interested in our 'new' archive of vintage patterns that belong to the theatre. These 420+ patterns are all being scanned, organized and properly stored. Once they are filed in the Costume Shop, they will be available for lending to our designers and sewers. (Approximately one-third are now completed.)

Our third segment was a great discussion about possibilities for workshops, how to tie our work into the needs of the Costume Loft, ideas for generating revenue for the theatre from our own pattern archive, how to expand and share resources, and how to focus the enormous talents and expertise within this group, beyond individual productions.



To get started in that direction, everyone who attended agreed to stand as members of a fledgling costuming group, tentatively called the **Langham Court Theatre Costumers Guild**. Why form a group?- Synergy and focus.

**Ned Lemley**, who unfortunately couldn't be with us, worked on this same idea (and the 'guild' name) when compiling a list of costumers, designers and milliners during production of *A Midsummer Night's Dream*. Ned was with us in spirit on Sunday afternoon!

Thanks to everyone who attended the tea. We are all busy with other things, but the effort was well worth it: there was great energy and flow to the afternoon, and everybody seemed very excited about the possibilities. Let's continue! #### Cameron Kidd

Cameron Kidd's paintings develop from a diverse collection of drawings as he endeavours to transform them into something structurally concrete. He creates and translates his art through different media, working by trial and error, using dedication and forward thinking to continually challenge himself. His goal is to create pieces which are balanced within their composition while utilizing line and symbolism. He uses paint to evolve the drawing concepts into a richer, larger format while maintaining the simplicity of the original idea. His current large work is part of a long-term exploration of color and subject matter. Inspired by randomness, lucidity and the continually changing possibilities of thought, he is always trying to create something visually new. He explores many ideas and constantly challenges himself to step into the unknown, creating a large and diverse array of visual material.

#### Peter Allen

Peter Allen has grown up in the Victoria graffiti art community of the 90s, and has moved into oil painting on canvas, learning to replace spray with brush. Still very involved in painting walls; he uses the skills of a house painter to execute his murals with acrylic latex, large brushes and rollers. His move into oil painting has recently inspired a combination of acrylic and oil, with the added dimension of wood cutouts stacked over layers of paint. This has given way to a more "arts and crafts" approach... making anything possible. He is inspired by the Garry Oaks that surround us, the evolution and deconstruction of calligraphy, textile patterns, and the pursuit of painting for the enjoyment of creation.
