# Something you've been told...and something you haven't!

First, the "something" you already know about – this coming summer, the theatre gets new seats and I encourage you all, finances permitting, to donate a seat to the cause and have your name displayed on that seat for years to come.

The "something" that you haven't been told is the amount of work that will be required to do the job properly and the rest of the ambitious changes that will go along with it.

The following is a list of the work that is planned:

- 1) removal of the name plaques from the existing seats for re-display somewhere in the theatre (location yet to be determined)
- 2) removal and disposal of the current seats (big job!)
- 3) removal and disposal of the carpet from the aisles and stairs
- 4) relocating of the vents in the floor behind row L
- 5) resurfacing of the auditorium floor
- 6) installation of electrical wiring for aisle lights
- 7) repainting of the walls, ceiling and floor of the auditorium
- 8) repairing or reinstalling railing newel posts
- 9) installation of new seats
- 10) re-carpeting of aisles and stairs

Items 6), 9) and 10) will be done by trades-people – the rest we are doing ourselves as we simply cannot afford to pay to have the work done. Langham runs on volunteers and I'm asking once again for volunteers to help with this massive undertaking.

The Project Committee that is overseeing this project is composed of **Bill Adams**, **Joan Patrick**, **Rick Schick** and myself. The organization of most of the work is already planned out: **Bill Adams** will be looking after resurfacing the floors and any carpentry work and I will be focusing on getting the plaques removed and the old seats removed. We would both be grateful for help. Now, is there someone in our membership who would be willing to organize and co-ordinate the painting of the auditorium? The work will take place from the day after *Perfect Wedding* closes (June 27<sup>th</sup>) to July 31<sup>st</sup>.

#### A President Past and A President Present:

**Sylvia Rhodes** and **Toshik Bukowiecki** are two of our Presidents who combine enormous creativity, down to earth practicality, and a great flair for leadership.

#### Sylvia Rhodes

Sylvia arrived in Victoria in 1976 from England via Calgary (where she performed opposite **Christopher Newton** in Charley's Aunt and Private Lives), Vancouver and Saskatoon (where she was directed by **Hetty Clews** in a children's production of Hansel and Gretel). Soon after arriving, Sylvia auditioned and was cast in *Mixed Doubles* at **Langham Court Theatre**. This was followed by leading roles in The Importance of Being Earnest (October 1976), Semi-Detached (April 1977), Alphabetical Order (February 1978) and Cause Célèbre (May/June 1981). Sylvia returned to the professional theatre working with Bastion, The Belfry, The White Rock Theatre Company and The Arts **Club** in Vancouver. Sylvia's career as a professional actress ended when she and her new partner moved to Africa where they remained for approximately nine years. In 1993, two years following their return to Victoria, Sylvia returned to Langham Court to play Charlotte in Tom Stoppard's The Real Thing directed by Judy Treloar. Tragically, Sylvia's husband became ill and died in late 1994. Since that time, Sylvia has become deeply involved in all aspects of the Victoria Theatre Guild.

As well as playing leading roles in many productions, Sylvia has worked backstage on Costumes, Props and as a producer. She has also served on the Board in a variety of capacities. In 1977 she was elected **Hetty Clews** Vice-President and served as Acting President from April until August when Hetty resigned. At the same time Sylvia took over the role of Production Chair from April until October when **Mary Jane Lewis** quit. From January 1978 to April 1981 Sylvia worked on a number of committees including Membership, Publicity, House Management, Box Office as well as working on the Play Selection committee headed by Production Chair **Robert Price**. After returning from Africa

and becoming involved once again with Langham Court, Sylvia joined Production Chair **Ruth Phillips**' Play Selection Committee in 1994. In 1998, Sylvia's involvement increased with her work as Chair of the Telephone Committee, the Development Committee and the Eaton's Mall Display Committee. In January 1999 she was once more elected Vice-President and that year she served on the Open House Committee and chaired both the Membership and Personnel committees. January 2000 was the first year Sylvia was elected President and she continued thus until January 2003. That did not prevent her from serving on a number of committees including the ones dealing with Personnel and the annual Open House. In January 2003, Sylvia became Past-President and in 2005 she took on the role of Production Chair. In January 2007, Sylvia again became President this time for just the year. However, her role as Past President was brief as she took on the duties of President once more in January 2009 until January 2010 when she happily relinquished the task to Toshik Bukowiecki.

In spite of her heavy involvement with the administrative side of Langham Court, Sylvia has maintained her commitment to the creative aspects of the theatre. Since 1994, she has acted in many productions including The Lion In Winter, Racing Demon, The Lady's Not For Burning, Under Milkwood, Bedroom Farce and A Shot in the Dark. She has also produced for shows such as *Blood Brothers*, Death of a Salesman, The Stillborn Lover, and The Noble Spaniard as well as co-producing I Hate Hamlet, Under Milkwood, The Long Weekend, Pack of Lies, and, of course, the present production *Sylvia*. In February/ March 2008 Sylvia became the first Producer of the Play Reading Group later named **The Readers Theatre**. As a member of Readers Theatre, Sylvia performed in Clara's on the Curtains and directed Trapped which was performed on February 27<sup>th</sup> of this year. In January 2000, Sylvia acted as Assistant Director for **Judy Treloar's** production **Betrayal**, two years later she was Assistant Director, this time for Dick Stille's Dancing at Lughnasa, then in 2003 for Laura K Bird's production The Trip to Bountiful. In September 2002 Sylvia made her directorial debut with *The Mousetrap*. The next year she directed *A Will to Kill For*, followed in quick succession by Private Lives, School for Scandal, An Act of the Imagination, Shadowlands, A Party to Murder, and Picnic. Whether she's back stage, on stage, in the boardroom or joining in a sing-along in the lounge, Sylvia definitely deserves a Leading Role in the annals of the Victoria Theatre Guild.



Toshik first came to Victoria in 1969 after studying Theatre Education at the University of Calgary. He had to leave Victoria for several months but was able to return in time to join the cast of Langham Court's production *I am a Camera* in August 1972. As well as taking on one of the main roles in that production, Toshik was also in charge of set décor. This established a precedent for Toshik as *Langham Court Theatre's* Renaissance man. During the 1970's he acted in five more shows, did set décor and set construction for 14 shows, designed the set for 6 shows, designed the lights for 3 shows, was lighting technician for two shows, crewed for two more, Stage Managed one show, assistant directed one show and was Director for another.

During the early 1970's the Victoria Theatre Guild and the UVic Theatre Department were working together on a number of productions. This close cooperation between the two was a factor in persuading Toshik to return to Theatre School in 1974 after he had served on the Guild Board, on John Krich's Production Committee and on the Maintenance Committee. Toshik studied and worked as a Teaching Assistant at UVic from 1974 until 1977. At the end of his course, Toshik went to Fort Steele as Company Manager to a group from UVic. While there he looked after the Front of House and Box Office as well as recasting all the parts at three-week intervals.

When he returned from Fort Steele, Toshik came back to Langham Court and in 1978 took over as Maintenance Chair and Technical Director – assigned to supervise set design and construction, lighting design, care and use of lighting equipment, renovations and general maintenance. In May 1978 he became Production Chair for the 1978-79 season after the person elected in the previous January resigned. During his term as Production Chair Toshik recommended that guidelines be prepared for Directors, Producers and Stage Managers. In December 1978 he directed *Boeing-Boeing*, replacing Jane MacKay (French) who had become ill in September but who returned later to work as Assistant Director. Demands of his day job forced Toshik to step down from the Board in January 1979 but

he was able to act as design consultant and set builder for **Noel Coward's** *Design for Living* in May 1979.

In the summer of 1979 Toshik returned to Fort Steele as a professional Stage Manager. He then went on to Saskatoon to become Stage Manager at the **Twenty-Fifth Street Theatre**. Next he moved to **The Citadel Theatre** in Edmonton where he remained as Resident Stage Manager until June 1984 at which time he returned to Vancouver. In February 1986, Toshik was hired as Production Stage Manager for the **EXPO** '86 opening ceremonies. He started work in May 1986 and spent the rest of EXPO '86 as Stage Manager for several shows a day at the **Amega Theatre** in Canada Place. After nine months, Toshik had had enough and decided to stay away from theatre work for a few years. He then took an eight-month course as a pharmaceutical technician and was hired by St Paul's **Hospital** even before his course was finished. He remained at **St Paul's** until 1997 when he returned to Victoria and in 1998 he returned to **Langham Court Theatre**.

In no time at all, Toshik was once again deeply involved in productions at **Langham Court**. As an actor he performed in shows such as Money and Friends, Of Mice and Men, The Heiress, A Will to Kill For, Racing Demon, and The Stillborn Lover. As a Producer he worked on Betrayal and Scotland **Road** (along with **Thelma Midori**). He was also the second to produce for **Reader's Theatre** when they performed the double bill Trifles and Hands Across the Sea (in both of which he also acted). As a Set Designer Toshik has created masterpieces for Blood Brothers, School For Scandal, You'll Get Used To It: The War Show (which he also co-directed along with Alan Penty), Waiting in the Wings and Pack of Lies. As a Director, Toshik was responsible for productions such as Gigi, Departures and Arrivals, An Inspector Calls, The Curious Savage, I Hate Hamlet, Bedroom Farce, The Long Weekend, and That Summer. As well, Toshik has worked on set construction, set décor and lighting design for numerous productions.

In spite of a demanding day job and heavy involvement in numerous productions, Toshik has held the position of Production Chair for a total seven years, making him the longest serving Production Chair in the history of the Victoria Theatre Guild. He has also been Chair of the Long Term Planning Committee and has been responsible for arranging for the new seats to come into the theatre next summer (a job that has cost him many sleepless nights). He was also President from 2004 to 2006 and in charge of the major renovations that took place between 2005 and 2006. In that role it was quite usual to find Toshik standing on a ladder wielding a paintbrush either downstairs in the rehearsal room or green room or upstairs in the lobby. There are few corners of the building that have not benefited from Toshik's tender care. Actor, Director, Set Designer, Stage Manager, Board Member, Committee Chair, wielder of the magic paintbrush, and now President – Toshik is truly our man of many parts. Our Renaissance man!

#### Harry Potter meets Oak Bay

The Village of Ploverleigh (think of Oak Bay as it would have been about 140 years ago) is a clean, quiet, sober place, where nothing unusual or unplanned ever happens. The people walk about in even numbers - in groups of twos, fours, sixes, and so forth. No one ever tries anything that hasn't been done many times before, so life, as you can imagine, is even and predictable. The inhabitants rarely travel outside of the village limits, so the villagers are naturally very shy and reluctant to meet anyone new. One of the quirky results of this natural shyness is a reluctance to make friends with the opposite sex. Therefore, there seem to be an inordinate number of single people in this particular village. However, life is comfortable and the villagers like it that way.

One day, one of their sons, Alexis, (we think of him as Harry) decides that it's time the villagers have a bit of a shake-up. He enlists the help of a Sorcerer (Dumbledore's not-so-nice cousin perhaps?) and doses the entire population with a magic potion that guarantees the drinker will fall in love with the first person he or she lays her eyes on. In case you're wondering, the potion has been brewed

on strictest principles: on married people it has no effect whatsoever. So, the Sorcerer calls upon his attendant spirits (dementors) and amidst a great deal of bangs, crashes, and smoke, the potion is created. It is then served up to all the villagers in a lovely tea brewed by the local vicar. You can imagine the crazy things that happen after that - the vicar falls in love with Alexis' fiancee (Aline/Hermione), Lady Sangazure falls in love with the Sorcerer, and the notary (a.k.a. Snape) falls in love with the 50-years-younger pewopener's daughter. You'll have to see the performance to find out how things work out in the end, but be assured many surprising couplings will take place!

The Sorcerer is Gilbert and Sullivan's first full-length collaboration. It is full of exuberant good humour, social satire, and music that ranges from buoyant and bouncy to dramatically compelling. Music direction is under the baton of Rick Underwood, stage direction by Wendy Merk, choreography by Scott Vannan and set design by Bill Adams. In addition, we are fortunate to have members of the Canadian Pacific Ballet adding an extra dollop of visual delights.

### Mrs Dexter and Her Daily by Joanna Glass

Mrs. Dexter and Her Daily by Joanna Glass is a joint production of the Arts Club Theatre in Vancouver and the National Arts Centre in Ottawa. It is a two-hander, starring Nicola Cavendish as the "Daily", and Fiona Reid, as Mrs. Dexter. In Vancouver, it was presented at the Stanley Industrial Alliance Stage, a very wide proscenium arch stage and a large auditorium that holds 650 people. There is a single set, a fabulous kitchen in a grand Rosedale home in Toronto.

Joanna Glass writes thoughtful pieces. Langham Court produced her play, *Artichoke*, a few years ago, an interesting mélange of characters and stories. This piece, however, is basically a one-woman show (for two women, if that makes any sense). The Daily is onstage alone for the entire first act. Then, in Act 2, Mrs. Dexter is on her own. There is no dialogue between the two, although the play is advertised as the last day these two women, who have become best friends over a period of many years, will spend together.

Both these actresses have long pedigrees. Indeed, I could watch **Nicola Cavendish** do just about anything. She is

able to create intimacy in the first act where none is physically available. She makes it seem like a lengthy conversation between friends. (Nicola and the audience). While we have this wonderful time, she is busy going about her business, ironing, preparing food, cleaning, climbing ladders etc. She is very funny and her sense of comic timing superb. In Act Two, **Fiona Reid** appears. Her husband has divorced her and married a neighbour, and her house has to be sold. She drinks rye the whole time she is onstage and becomes increasingly maudlin as the show progresses. It is depressing to watch and I found myself longing for the Daily to appear to cheer her up. But she doesn't, and the play ends much as Act Two begins, with Mrs. Dexter moaning about having to move to a condo.

To me the play felt unfinished and the casting of **Fiona Reid**, not quite right. Her character was written as close to a nervous breakdown and Fiona had far too strong a presence and voice to convey this successfully. Of course, she was competing with the perfection of the first act. Its effect lingered, and, although I did not enjoy much about Act Two, the visit to Vancouver was worth it, just to be in **Nicola Cavendish's** presence.

This year—2010—marks the 24th anniversary of a unique, home grown community theatre group that caters exclusively to the needs and concerns of seniors and those who serve them. Started in 1986 as an experiment by a small group of over-55 performers with a mission to improve the lives of seniors and increase community awareness of seniors' issues, Target continues to flourish despite the usual challenges faced by non-profit societies. Last year was one of the busiest in Target's history with 14 performances of the popular Alzheimers' play, I'm Still Here, and the development of a new play about seniors and driving safety called Age on Wheels. Age on Wheels, with six recent performances and several more on the calendar, promises to be another "hit" feature of **Target's** repertoire. Other successful plays have included Wot No Soap, about living through WWII, I'm Herbert, about keeping memories fresh into your 80s, and Nobody Wants My Old Organs. about the ultimate act of recycling.

Target generates most of its own material through improvisation, play development workshops, and contributions by players who enjoy the challenge of script writing. Occasionally, if the material fits the group's mandate to "teach through entertainment," Target uses material by other writers. I'm Still Here and I'm Herbert fall into that category. In the case of *I'm Still Here*, Target has exclusive rights to perform the play on Vancouver Island. As a result, **Target** has toured the play as far north as Qualicum Beach, performing for family and institutional caregivers, volunteers, Hospice workers, and nurses in training, On the lighter side, Target's new play Age on Wheels has entertained delighted audiences at seniors' residences and seniors' activity centres throughout the Capital Region.

Ups and downs have been a feature of **Target's** history, depending on circumstances such as funding-mostly from small grants and donations—and the health and energy of its members. There have been a number of losses over the past 24 years, all keenly felt by a tight-knit and dedicated group that spends at least three to six hours together every week studying, rehearsing and developing new ideas. Nevertheless, the spirit behind **Target's** initial idea remains strong—using theatre to provide a voice for the concerns of seniors.







#### Our Costuming Library is **Expanding!**
