Directed **By Sylvia Rhodes**, this uproarious comedy will have audiences rolling out of their brand-new seats at the antics of an impressive cast of characters that include **Christine Karpiak** as the hypochondriac and ultra neat-freak, Florence, newcomer **Shelley Superstein** as her friend, flat mate and super-slob, Olive, with **Jo Barnes** (Renee), **Kathy Macovichuk** (Sylvie), **Fran Patterson** (Vera), **Colleen Sullivan** (Mickey), and playing the two Spanish gentlemen, **Brian Adams** as Jesus and **Wayne Yercha** as Manolo.

The Odd Couple – Female Version is produced by **Vinnie Chadwick**, with Set Design by **Tony Hubner**, Props and Décor by **Sally Crickman** and Lighting Design by **Craig Mracek**. **Anne-Marie Arneson** is the Costume Designer and **Corinna Gilliland** the Sound Designer with much help from our resident Technical Guru **Alan MacKenzie** and from **Diana Keating** who is also Assistant Director. by **Hetty Clews**, and *The Monkey's Paw* directed by **Toshik Bukowiecki.** The **Readers' Theatre** auditions will be on Monday, September 13th with the performance on Saturday, October 23rd.

If you can't find enough to do around Langham Court, the Friends of The Greater Victoria Public Library are having a book sale at Nellie McClung Library Saturday, September 25th from 5p.m. to 8p.m. and Sunday, September 26th from 9:00 a.m. to 3:00 p.m.. Then St Lukes' will be holding auditions for their annual Christmas pantomime, *Robinson Crusoe*, on Friday October 1st and Saturday October 2nd followed on October 13th by the first production of their season, *Arsenic and Old Lace* (which is rife with Langham Court members). So you can enjoy a busy and productive autumn or stay at home and see what the new season on television has to offer – it's your choice – enjoy!

Notes from Aloft The Giant Annual Costume Sale

The volunteers fell into two categories: the repeaters and the newbies. The repeaters noticed the newbies, and from all reports I've had so far the newbies felt welcomed and want to become repeaters.

I've done the math as they say.

On the day of the sale, 33 volunteers put in a total of 192 hours. From Monday Aug. 2nd to the end of the day on the 8th, 417 were put in. Prior to August but in preparation for the sale, 75 hours were spent. My grand total of person hours spent on the sale is 492 hours, but I suspect I don't have a complete record.

The earnings for the sale are (unofficially) \$4,727.59. We do not have to subtract the rack rentals because **Saanich Rentals** did not charge us...perhaps due to the influence of **Alf Small**, who has an account and who paid for the

delivery and pick up of those racks. Thanks Alf, you are a true Courtier.

We do have to subtract the \$161.00 that goes to the **Costume Workshop** account for the yardage **Lisa Leighton** prepared and sold, and the cost of feeding a light lunch to the volunteers (Thanks Vinnie and Sally, it was delicious and inexpensive!), and then we still have more than we got last year!

Under the heading of OTHER

A great deal more culling of the Loft by volunteers was done this year during June and July. Hats off to **Susan Ferguson**, **Di Madill**, **Madeleine Mills**, **Jane Kreiger**, **Antoinette Church**, **Jean de Cartier**, and who am I forgetting at the moment?

Many buyers said things to the cashiers like, "I didn't have to wait long at all this year." "Because you have more people helping, it was a treat." "Even in the crush at the beginning everything was calmer and more pleasant." The pre-sale (meaning the shopping by volunteers before the public came in) netted a surprising amount. Thanks again volunteers. Call me next June to get in on **The Giant Annual Costume Sale 2011**.

While we had quite a lot more items to display, sell, dispose of at the end, we had fewer so-called "High End" items for sale. Several repeaters made comments to this effect, and I agreed.

More than one volunteer said, "I didn't think we were as busy as in earlier years." I think that was because of having twice the number of floor-walkers as in earlier years, but next year I want to count how many attend. I want to know what the Fire Marshall will allow on the main floor and I want to consider how to let the right number of persons in at any given time.

Speaking of disposing of things: During the one hour and a half it took to take almost everything down significant contributions were made to **Hospice**, **Our Place**, and **Big Brothers and Big Sisters**. A few items went back to the loft and a few others went into storage for next year.

Several suggested that structuring the lunch break a little more was a better idea and no one felt rushed back into the fray. Having a greeter in the lane was a good idea and **Fran Patterson** who spent most of the day there (with **Madeleine Mills** spelling her off) has some recommendations I'll be glad to receive.

Something I forgot to say when I exhorted the troops to smile and help and welcome the public: I failed to mention that The Loft (a significant source of income for Langham Court) now has enough traffic during the months of October/November and April/May that volunteers are needed to provide better service than I can provide alone. I am prepared to train persons interested in helping people find what they are looking for and how to fill out invoices and receive payment and file the information appropriately.

During those four months we will be open for business not only on Wed. and Fri. afternoons and Sat. mornings but also on Monday from 4 p.m. to 7 or 8 p.m.

I will need at least two assistants during those times. I believe this mirrors the arrangement in the Box Office that Denise manages and volunteers provide services in addition to hers. The Loft has never advertised (except for the annual sale), but word of mouth and the fact that many more people are involved in performances has led us to a great deal more traffic and increased income for the theatre. It behooves us as an organisation to provide better service to our community in exchange for monies we no longer receive through gaming.

If you think you might be interested, please contact me and let's talk about it some more.

One more thing: In a spirit of transparency and because I was asked, let me tell you that my contract with the board pays me for 16 hours a week (except in high-traffic months when it is 18 or 19 hours a week) and I am given a bonus of 5% of gross receipts. The rest of the time I volunteer, just like so many of you, and I'm glad to do it as you are.

I think that about wraps up The **Giant Annual Costume Sale for 2010** which, according to Jill Groves, is our 20th. Please direct questions or comments to me or to our wonderful editor who is not only a repeater for many years but put in almost as much time as I did!

News, Views, Reviews and Thank-you's A Super Sweeney

On a lovely night in late July, Elana and I slipped over to **Langham Court** Theatre to catch the **Roger Carr** directed, two nights only *Sweeney Todd*, a Sondheim classic. To our chagrin, it was sold out; we scooped up two of the few remaining tickets for the second night.

How lucky we did.

In the two weeks between July 3rd and their opening, the Comox Youth Musical Centre (CYMC) created a wonderful production of this horrifying but comic awardwinning revenge play. The plot centres on Sweeney Todd, (Adam Kozlick) returning to London after fifteen years transported to Australia on false charges. Sweeney opens a barbershop on Fleet Street. determined to wreak revenge on all who had wronged him, including Judge Turpin (Nathaniel Gordon) who stole Sweeney's wife and infant daughter. His revenge is to slit the throats of his wrongdoers and drop their bodies off his chair into the waiting arms of Mrs. Lovett (Alison Roberts), who converts them into meat pies so delicious they become the talk of London. Gordon and Roberts in their roles are themselves deliciously evil and somehow endearing. The play ends with the stage littered with corpses, including Sweeney's and Mrs. Lovett's, but they all come back to life to sing the rousing finale.

I struggled to find weak moments during the two-hour evening. The pacing flagged a little at the beginning of the pie making and the energy dipped. But that would be expected in an ensemble cast that had just finished runs in Courtney and Duncan and had almost no time to get used to the **Langham Court** stage.

That said, we were impressed with the set design, which brought nervous laughter from the audience when the bodies slipped from Sweeney's barber chair down to Mrs. Lovett's oven. The choreography was a highlight with upwards of twenty young actors operating as a Greek chorus, all focused on their spot and reactions as the murderous or at times love scenes went on behind them. In fact, at times, 35 actors and four musicians occupied the stage – in tune, on time, and absorbed in their roles.

The chemistry among the director **Roger Carr**, the musical director **Kristopher Epps**, and vocal director **Ashley Daniel Foot** was obvious. *Sweeney Todd* has memorable, yet difficult music. These are not hum-along songs. Kudos go to all the performers for pulling off such a score in such short time. There was not one weak performance in the entire cast. **Adam Kozlick's** Sweeney sustained palpable menace and grief from the first moment. **Alison Robert's** Mrs. Lovett was remarkable; she was poised and filled the stage with a charming and nuanced performance. The rest of the cast provided a fine balance for these two.

Congratulations to **CYMC**. This Centre is making a lasting contribution to the development of talented young actors and musicians.

This summer the production team for *Sweeney Todd* had the mad idea of squeezing our 36 cast members, 7 musicians and large rolling set pieces onto the **Langham Court** stage and to initiate the activity at 9:00 a.m. on the morning of opening night! In particular, **Craig Mracek**, **Chad Laidlaw** and that newcomer **Alan Mackenzie** embodied what has kept me at **Langham Court** for many years. **Toshik Bukowiecki** and I spoke to the assembled young actors and I know they got

it. They understood that theatre is not just the lead role or an Equity card. They understood what **Langham Court** embodies – a creative family that makes magic happen night after night because we celebrate our art. Thanks to all those people who made this happen. And now, on to the next season. Thanks.

Antoinette Church: Fun loving dynamo with the impish grin

A life member since 1997, **Antoinette Church** has been involved in practically every aspect of theatrical production both on stage and behind the scenes. Not afraid to try new things, Antoinette believes that anything is worth doing as long as she can have some fun while doing it.

Born in Bristol, Antoinette's family eventually moved to London while Antoinette was still an infant. While living in London, the family suffered the loss of their elder daughter who, at age six when she died, was a year older than Antoinette. Shortly after that the war came, forcing the family to leave the city and move to Buckinghamshire where they lived in a four-hundredand-fifty year old cottage. Plans to send Antoinette and her brother to Canada for the duration of the war were aborted. Just as well! The ship they were to sail on, which was filled with evacuees, was bombed and sank leaving few survivors. Instead, Antoinette remained in Bucks where she went to St. Bernard's Convent School run by nuns from Belgium who spoke French amongst themselves, which their English students found very frustrating. Due to war-time shortages, Antoinette had to wear the same school uniform from age eleven until she was sixteen (so that's why the sixth form at St. Trinians had such skimpy uniforms!!).

After the war, and her schooling completed, Antoinette's family returned to London where Antoinette studied fencing, ballet and speech training and joined the **Ealing** Little Theatre (founded by Laurence Olivier). Her love of theatre was perhaps a legacy from her mother, who before the War had performed regularly in musicals. At this time the family lived near Denham Studios and Antoinette and her brother were given the grand tour while Olivier was filming *Henry V*.

In 1958, Antoinette moved to Canada on her own as the girlfriend supposed to come with her was forced to cancel her plans. The intrepid youngster sailed from Tilbury Docks via France and Scotland to Halifax. From Halifax she took the train to Toronto then moved to Sudbury, which she hated and on to Winnipeg, which she liked because the people were so friendly. She then hitchhiked to Vancouver (not daring to tell her parents) where she met journalist **Jurgen Hesse** who invited her to join him in Williams Lake. It was there that she married Jurgen, met her first cowboy, and had her first child, **Esther**. From Williams Lake the young family moved to Toronto, where **Rachel** was born.

From Toronto the family moved to Vancouver, where Antoinette became involved in the productions at the **York Theatre**, home of the **Vancouver Little Theatre**. Because of time constraints, Antoinette remained behind the scenes, concentrating mainly on Costumes.

In 1975, no longer with Jurgen, Antoinette and her two little girls moved to Victoria. It was then that Antoinette joined the Victoria Theatre Guild and became a vital member of our Company. In her first production in January 1976, Mixed Doubles, Antoinette worked on props. Then in February she worked on costumes for *Lloyd George Knew My Father*. In the first production of the next season, The Importance of Being Earnest, Antoinette took on the role of Costumes Designer. For several years Antoinette was either designing costumes, working on props, stage managing, or producing on practically every show at Langham Court. Between 1976 and 1983, she worked on more than 20 productions. In that time she appeared on stage once as Thalestris in *The* Rape of the Belt in April 1978. In Joseph Andrews, which opened September 1983, Antoinette offered to step into the role of Mrs. Andrews as the actress originally cast had disappeared leaving director **Judy Treloar** in a bit of a bind, to say the least.

From then on Antoinette spent more time on stage even though she was still working back stage designing costumes, doing set décor and producing. During the next 15 years she appeared in more than twenty **Theatre Guild** productions including *Harvey*, *Pride and Prejudice*, *Breath of Spring*, *Hadrian the Seventh*, 42nd Street, The Suicide and *Fool's Paradise*. Her last appearance on stage at Langham Court Theatre was in School For Scandal, in which she refused to be upstaged by the largest and most flamboyant hat ever created. Although no longer willing to take on major roles on stage, Antoinette is an active participant in **Readers' Theatre** productions and appears regularly in the annual Christmas Panto at **St. Lukes** in which she is surrounded by old friends and is given roles that don't require huge chunks of memorization.

As well as all her work both backstage and in front of audiences, Antoinette has been a regular at the Costume Sales, has worked on several Production Committees, organised Club Nights, worked on both the Producer and Costume Designer manuals for Langham Court, and was the Victoria Theatre Guild representative at a Theatre B.C. conference in Nanaimo in November 1990.

One of **Langham Court's** most active members, Antoinette has also worked extensively outside the confines of the VTG. A member of IATSE, she has worked backstage at the McPherson Theatre for out of town productions, at the Newcombe Auditorium doing costumes for the Hosie family productions, and she has performed in film, television and radio. A busy woman, also a generous one: there have been innumerable occasions when Antoinette has opened her house to Langham Court members when a rehearsal space or meeting place has been needed. In spite of raising two children and holding down a demanding job at the Victoria Art Gallery for nineteen years, Antoinette has willingly shared her limited time and her unlimited talents with Langham Court and with other theatre companies in Victoria.
