The Non Profit-Organisation Threshold Housing Society

The mission of the **Threshold Housing Society** is to provide transitional housing for youth at risk of being homeless. We serve males and females aged 16 to 21. Many of these young people find themselves in need because they have had to leave abusive households or were abandoned; some were forced by circumstances into the street. On a daily basis, we house youths that are often confused, anxious and frightened because they are unable to support themselves and they have no place to live. By offering stable housing, these youngsters are better able to work toward school completion, participate in programs, or gain employment, experience. Over the long run, and with the respite that stable housing provides, the young people we serve make healthier choices for their future.

Threshold is happy to report that some of our past residents have finished their schooling, sought full-time employment, and become independent and productive members of the community. We are the only semi-independent transitional youth housing provider on Vancouver Island. We ensure

eight hours of staffing per day, seven days a week. We are not a group home or care facility. Our supervisors maintain structure and order regarding household chores and rules, as well as offering a compassionate adult presence. Residents are responsible for their own food, laundry, tidying, house chores, and must attend a legitimate day program (school/training/paid work/volunteer work). The **Threshold Housing Society** has been operating in the Victoria region since 1990 and we have had approximately 200 youth pass through our doors. We believe we have a solid and proven formula for assisting youth at-risk of homelessness. Please

Remembering When...

(An occasional column in which members reminisce about happenings and mis-happenings on stage, back stage or in the wings at **Langham Court Theatre**. And now over to Jutta):

The Show Must Go On

We had picked a wonderful play: *Fallen Angels*, with Marge Bridgeman, Hetty Clews, and a great young actor who played the Frenchman. The production was directed by John Heath, who also designed the costumes and set. The whole thing was in white, except for a big red heart on the Frenchman's naked chest! Towards the end, there was a major sound and light cue, with a French Flag flown in and the Marseillaise playing full blast! It was the biggest lighting/sound Cue Langham Court has ever had, and it was fabulous.

At the time, our theatre was still quite primitive in that the lighting booth consisted of a tiny cubicle in the middle of, and jutting out from, the back wall. It was only accessible through a door in the auditorium and a small door from the outdoor walkway. As Stage Manager for this production, I sat stage right in the wings with a cue sheet and head phones, giving light and sound cues to the operator in the booth.

I called the man in the booth (**Malcolm** was his name), warning him of the big cues coming up. Suddenly, there was heavy breathing and gasping coming over the head-phones: "I can't breathe. I think I'm going to faint!"

"Nonsense," I hissed back, "Malcolm, you can't faint now, we have a big cue coming up!"

There was more heavy breathing. I looked around the dark

backstage for some help. I spotted **Brian Lenton** and signalled him to come over. I whispered in his ear, "Go to the outside door of the Lighting Booth immediately. Drag Malcolm out into the fresh air and take his head-phones. Put them on and I will give you the big lighting and sound cue!

Anxious moments passed, then I heard Brian's voice: "What do I do now?" So with just moments to spare, I filled him in. (Brian was a quick learner!) Right on cue, the French Flag flew in; the lights changed to blue, white and red; and a fortissimo *La Marseillaise* played triumphantly! *Fait accompli*!

The audience and cast were totally unaware of the backstage drama, and the show concluded to thunderous applause!

The cause? The lighting booth was very hot at times because it lacked sufficient ventilation. This caused the fire extinguisher to release the gas which nearly suffocated poor Malcolm. He revived slowly on the dark patio where Brian had dragged him.

Thanks to my quick thinking and Brian's cooperation, Malcolm recovered completely and the whole episode reinforced that old 'Show Biz' saying." The Show Must Go On!"

Sylvia Lindstrom – A Most Welcome addition to the Life Member Rogues Gallery



Sylvia Lindstrom is that rare creature amongst the Langham Court population. She is a native British Columbian; born in Vancouver and grew up in Burnaby. She attended Burnaby Central High where she included theatre amongst her courses in Junior High. As a senior she was involved in a number of plays, and

even managed to find her way on stage in a production of *The Lottery*. With her usual modesty, Sylvia claims that she was given the role solely because of her physical similarity to the young man portraying her brother. For several years after graduating in 1969, Sylvia had little opportunity to get involved in any theatre. She had moved to East Vancouver and there was no Community Theatre in her neighbourhood, and being a single parent by this time, she had little opportunity to seek out community theatres miles from home.

In 1979, Sylvia and her son were holidaying near Courtenay. Sylvia, who worked in a print shop in the Lower Mainland, fell in love with the area, the town and the reasonable real estate prices. By coincidence, as she and her son were driving through Courtenay, Sylvia spotted a print shop. She went in, dressed in camping gear, to enquire if there were any openings. It transpired that their typesetter was retiring at the end of the summer and that the shop was becoming computerized. It also transpired that the program they were adopting was one that Sylvia had been accustomed to using. Needless to say, Sylvia was hired. Within a short time, Sylvia and her seven-year old son Sean, were living in their own home in a community that was ideal for raising kids and getting involved in theatre, or music or any one of the arts, all of which flourished in Courtenay. An added bonus for Sylvia was the

fact that the print shop was right across the road from Sean's school.

While she was in Courtenay, Sylvia once again became involved in theatre. She started by working on props, and soon was asked to ASM and then be Stage Manager. The theatre company performed in Courtenay's Civic Theatre which, according to Sylvia, is a really terrific facility. Alas, in 1983 the print shop went out of business and it was becoming increasingly difficult to find work in Courtenay. So finally in January 1985, Sylvia came down to Victoria to look for work. While here she got work with **Pacific Opera** as Assistant Stage Manager and crew. At that time, **Cameron More** was the General Manager, and it was he who commandeered his brother **Don** to help pick up some set pieces for Faust. A month or so later, Sylvia was asked to work on Sweenv Todd for Bastion Theatre. While working on the show, she stayed with Cameron More and his wife, and saw quite a bit of Don. She also met Judy **Treloar**, who was also working on *Sweeney Todd* and it was Judy's recommendation that she go and see *Entertaining Mr*. Sloane at Langham Court.

April 15, 1985 was a significant day for Sylvia. It was her first date with **Don More**, whom she married later that year, and it was her first time at **Langham Court Theatre**. The following month, Sylvia moved down to Victoria. Recognising the precarious nature of professional theatre, she began working for the government and became increasingly involved in community theatre.

Sylvia began working with **Langham Court** in 1987, assisting **Helen Bunyon** with props for *Toys in the Attic*. In May, she took charge of props for *Critics Choice* and the following year stage-managed *Heloise and Abelard* for Judy.

It soon became apparent that Sylvia had found her theatrical niche. Her ability as a stage manager was demonstrated again and again in such productions as A Chorus of Disapproval (November 1988), Act of the Imagination (January 1991), Beyond Reasonable Doubt (May 1991), Lettice and Lovage (May 1994), The Dining Room (November 2001), The Lion in Winter (January 2003), Rebecca (September 2003), Racing Demon (November 2003), The Glass Menagerie (January 2004), The Lady's Not for Burning (June 2004), *The Unexpected Guest* (September 2005), Waiting in the Wings (March 2007), Scotland Road (November 2007), That Summer (January 2009), Pack of Lies (May 2009), The History Boys (January 2010), Silver Dagger (April 2010), and our most recent production, The Laramie Project (January 2011). In January 2008, Sylvia also stagemanaged the fund-raiser Tales of Shakespeare and Stories of Stratford: An Evening with Sara Topham.

As one of our most accomplished stage managers, Sylvia was one of the authors of the Stage Manager's Handbook and the Producer's Handbook that she worked on with **Thelma Midori** and **Maria Noel**. She has also been a mentor to neophyte stage managers such as **Alexis Kuss** and **Elizabeth Whitmarsh**, both of whom have flourished under her tutelage. During rehearsals of *That Summer*, Sylvia was mentoring **Angela Henry** until Angela was called upon to take over one of the major roles. During that production, there was a scene in which Angela's character had to be seen looking at a cemetery headstone while voices

could be heard singing offstage. Problems in the booth! The music didn't come up and Angela was forced to ad lib. Then Sylvia noted that the headstone was not on stage. Next thing she saw, one of the actresses, a ten-year old child, walked onto the stage carrying the supposedly heavy, stone marker. Fortunately, the audience accepted the situation and didn't laugh at all.

As well as working on productions, Sylvia has served as Board Secretary, has been Chair of the Membership Committee, and has been a member of the Play Selection Committee many times. Although she has put in many hours at Langham Court, Sylvia has found the time and energy to stage-manage two productions for Shakespeare in the Summer, to work on a number of VOS shows, and to be involved in Fringe Festival shows every year for the past five years (including the 2008 production *The Measure of Love*, which was performed at Langham Court in 2009 as part of a fund raiser for women's shelters). She also worked with Judy Treloar on Fringe productions in the late 1980s early 1990s.

At the moment, Sylvia is looking forward to going to Vancouver to celebrate her son's fortieth birthday and to seeing her 9-year old grandson but it won't be long before you'll see her smiling face in the Stage Manager's booth once again.
