

The **artsREACH** project is managed by the **OCTA** Collective Society, a Victoria-based charitable organisation with the mission of providing programs and services that educate, support and inspire individuals to effect positive change within our community.

The **OCTA Collective Society** has been bringing theatre and visual art workshops to economically marginalised children in the Capital Region since 2005 through our **artsREACH** programs. With a mandate to provide all children with the opportunity to develop life skills by exploring their potential through arts experiences, OCTA - Only Creative Thinking Allowed has delivered 555 theatre and visual arts workshops to 10,000+ low-income children, grades K-7, in 42 schools in 3 school districts over the past 5 years. To reach the most vulnerable children who would benefit most, **artsREACH** focuses on schools with a high percentage of kids from low-income families who are least likely to have access to a high-quality arts education.

The Langham Court Theatre community is already well aware of how the arts enrich our lives in myriad ways that stay with us long after the lights have been

#### Next Meeting of the Costume Guild

Langham Court Theatre is humming with the first shows of the new season, so it's time to reconvene the Costume Guild after the summer break and continue sharing ideas,



resources and thoughts.

Our next meeting is scheduled

for Saturday, October 2, 1:00 to 4:00 p.m. in the Lounge at the theatre.

If you have ever wanted to be able to translate a design you have seen into a sewing pattern, you won't want to miss this meeting. For those who do and for those who don't know how to create a basic pattern or sloper, we will be doing a hands-on "Introduction to Slopers," sharing ideas and information as long-time volunteer designer Ann-Marie Arneson steps us through developing a sloper for a bodice. We will fit and mark up a muslin, and then transfer those markings onto paper or cardboard to create the sloper template. Ann-Marie will also talk about how to use that template to create different styles. (If we have time, we may also explore a bit about an associated topic – draping.) If you are interested in participating, please wear an old top, as we will be marking the muslins with permanent markers, and please bring the following materials:

- sewing kit (scissors, straight and safety pins, measuring tape, etc.)

- medium- (best) or fine-tip (second-best) permanent markers in at least two colours (large tips won't work) – Sharpies are good

muslin, old sheeting or other plain cotton or firm cottonblend woven fabric for the fitting (enough to fit a bodice front and back, plus extra if you want to experiment)
heavy paper, Bristol board or non-corrugated cardboard big enough to transfer the bodice muslin onto ... this will become your template or sloper. If you would rather just watch or help someone else with their sloper, no need to bring supplies.

# News, Views and Reviews

#### To the Fringe – and Beyond

One of the joys of Fringing is the interaction that goes on in the line-ups, strangers talking and giggling with strangers, strangers till a moment ago – comparing notes, offering recommendations, instant reviews. Chatting with buddies **Danda Humphreys** and **Julius Maslovat**; with Intrepid volunteer **Alan** (big guy multi-buttoned) who admitted, with two nights to go, to having seen 23 performances – another volunteer was well into the 30s! Marvelling when people said of **Langham Court**, "I've never been here before, this is fabulous", passing out a deal-closing brochure or two (how many does **Lesley** carry around?), enjoying the vitality and brio of the young performers pumping the line for their next show. High energy, great fun.

So it was a hugely successful **Fringe Festival** for **Intrepid Theatre** and an amazing opportunity-seized for **Langham Court** to introduce hundreds of new first-time bums onto those pristine seats. Talking to **Janet Munsil**, she confirmed the great feedback she'd had from patrons about **Langham Court** as a venue, so smiles all round and surely there'll be more to come.

Brief reviews/comments now as requested by our esteemed Editor. What with one thing and twelve others, we only caught five shows, four of them solos:

*Lucky 9* with West Coast Fringe veteran **TJ Dawe** was the most cerebral. At times comic, at others revealing family distress but mostly having fun getting his audiences to skewer themselves into one of the nine personality types of the Enneagram system. Philosophical and at times outrageous, not your average Fringe fare.

*The History of Lost and Found* duo worked their way through a tiny opening night crowd and produced a show about a couple working in the Lost and Found Department of a bus station: a good idea, charming performances and flashes of really good stuff but overall it felt like a work in progress.

*Dave Morris is an Asshole (and you can be one too!)* was an hour of zany improv that by its very nature both hit and missed the funny buttons - an incredibly physical comedian who must have lost 10 lbs a show and clearly enjoyed his work.

*Gun Powder* soloist Jayson McDonald was brilliant as ever, unravelling the plot of his own "murder" using the risible skills of bumbling detective "Tom Phox" and a gaggle of other crazy characters he introduced along the way. We saved the best to last, catching the Intrepid Benefit full house performance of *Gibberish* by Chris Gibbs at Langham Court on Saturday night. This guy plays the Brit performer-as-buffoon to wacky perfection and had his audience howling for an hour and a half, including (and he is demonstrably overweight) somersaults and cartwheels across the stage. Chris also had a one-man detective comedy *Antoine Feval* playing the Fringe, which was guaranteed to be just as hilarious.

**Intrepid** may have missed a beat following or leading this show by not thanking the packed house for supporting this **Intrepid** Benefit, to the tune of \$20 a ticket - and again for not publicly crediting the performer who, we were told, donated his comic gift and time, and maybe a sore back, to their worthy cause.

## **Remembering Cliff**

Actor, Director, Writer, Story Teller, Entrepreneur and Life Member **Cliff Clark** died Friday, September 3<sup>rrd</sup> after a lengthy and courageous battle with cancer. Cliff may not be familiar to many of you as he has been out of sight for the past twenty years, performing in his own theatre **Toad Hall** in Mill Bay.

In 1998, Cliff and his wife Barb were in Toronto coming back from the theatre to their hotel, walking along the sidewalk, when they were mowed down by a speeding motorist. Barb was killed and Cliff was forced to spend his remaining years in a wheel chair. A tragedy for such a vital, creative and active individual.

Cliff worked at **Langham Court** during the 1950s and 1960s, bringing a lot of publicity to the Guild (including newspaper headlines locally and radio publicity in the United States) and a lot of fun with his work on stage, always a delight.

Cliff became one of Victoria's top pantomime performers. He started in that direction, teaching kids how to work on stage in the early 1950s, and directing them in Theatre Festival performances. He played Mr. Toad in three productions of *Toad of Toad Hall* in Victoria in the late fifties and early sixties. During the 1960s he also played Widow Twanky in the **Guild** production **Aladdin** at the **McPherson Playhouse** – our first show in that venue. Since then, Cliff has performed with many **Langham Court** and **VOS** members including the cast of **Dick Whittington and his Cat** in which he gave an outstanding performance as the dame. In spite of his lengthy absence from our stage, Cliff was a major contributor toward the 2005-06 renovations at **Langham Court**.

Cliff will be missed by many long time members of the **Victoria Theatre Guild** and the **Victoria Operatic Society** as well as by his friends of which there are many and by his family.



#### Our self-styled curmudgeon and favourite volunteer – Garth Taylor

Born in Le Pas, Manitoba, **Garth Taylor** first came to Victoria in 1947. The following year as a Grade 8 student he became involved in theatre at **Tillicum School**. He then worked on several shows at **Mount View High School** including their 1952 entry in the **Greater Victoria Schools Drama Festival** in

which he played Dr. Gardiner in **Arnold Bennett's** *The Stepmother.* 

The following year, Garth joined the **RCAF** and spent the next thirty-five years being posted to a variety of places across Canada from the Queen Charlotte Islands to Newfoundland and around the world. Although signed up with the **Air Force**, Garth spent most of his career with the Navy working in Communications. For twelve years Garth was stationed in Whitehorse where he spent much of his free time working with the Whitehorse Little Theatre, both on stage and behind the scenes. In 1958, he was one of the first to work at the newly opened station at Alert on Ellesemere Island (according to Wikipedia, Canadian Forces Station Alert, a Signals Intelligence Intercept Facility, "is the northernmost settlement in the world"). Garth's next move was to Ottawa, where he went on a Russian language course before being assigned to translate Russian air-control tapes for the National Research

**Council.** Two years later he was posted to Bermuda, where he received his commission in 1968. Next stop, The Queen Charlottes followed by a stint in Washington where he spent three thoroughly enjoyable years working on National Security with the **U.S. Navy**. From Washington, Garth was transferred to Gander, Newfoundland where as a member of the local theatre group he was cast as Harry in **Edward Albee's** *Delicate Balance*. Then, it was back to Ottawa where he worked for the Director of Scientific and Technical Intelligence, evaluating and writing about foreign radar.

When he first arrived in Ottawa, Garth joined the Ottawa Little Theatre (Canada's longest running community theatre group, which even boasts a resident ghost named Martha) and each time he returned to the nation's capital, Garth re-established his commitment to that organisation, both as a Board Member and as an actor in their Children's Theatre, where he was called upon to play giants and ogres. One of his favourite parts was that of Glumph, a ten-foot-tall monster who sang "will Nobody Love Me?" until one performance when a small, blonde child looked up with big solemn eyes and said "I will."


Garth was with the Ottawa Little Theatre until he moved to Victoria in 1990. Shortly after his arrival here, he became involved with the **Victoria Theatre Guild**. His introduction to **Langham Court** was as one of the volunteers who helped paint the auditorium. He then became involved in productions, starting as Lighting Operator and crew for *Write Me a Murder* in September of 1991. The following February Garth worked as Assistant Producer on 42<sup>nd</sup> Street, Since then, Garth has been heavily involved in more than fifty Langham Court Productions including Hobson's Choice, This Happy Breed, Arcadia, The Importance of Being Earnest, Gigi, Blood Relations, Moon Over Buffalo, and Shadowlands, to name but a few.

As well as working like a dynamo on specific productions, Garth has always made himself available whenever a volunteer was needed at **Langham Court**. For work parties, newsletter mail-outs, Open Houses and Costume Sales, Garth has always been front and centre helping as much as he possibly could. He has also been an active member of many committees, including the Play Selection Committee and the Personnel Committee, and he vied with **Nan Long** as to who volunteered the most when Guild members were required to attend sessions at the **Esquimalt**  **Bingo Hall** in order for the Theatre to receive funding. As if the many, many hours Garth put in on behalf of Langham Court were not enough, he also served on the board for several years as Member-at-Large and Secretary until he was elected President in 2003. Unfortunately, for Garth and for us, he become the shortest-serving President on record due to a serious illness which forced him to resign the position and to undergo three major operations in two weeks, which, he said with typical understatement, wiped him out.

Although Garth has not run for office since his time in hospital, he has continued to be an invaluable member of the **Theatre Guild** Community and if anyone can refute the statement that no one is indispensable, it is Garth our quintessential volunteer.
