The Non Profit-Organisations

For *The Memory of Water* the Non Profit Organisation is the **OCTA Collective Society** and for *The Laramie Project* it is the **South Island Pride Community Centre**.

The **OCTA Collective Society** is a Victoria-based charitable organisation with the mission of providing programs and services that educate, support and inspire individuals to effect positive change within our community. It has been bringing theatre and visual art workshops to economically marginalised children in the Capital Region since 2005 through its **artsREACH** programs.

South Island Pride Community Centre (or **SIPC Centre**) was established in July of 2009 as an answer to a need in the **LGBTQ** Community of Greater Victoria to have a front door and a communal meeting space. In addition to general community programming and services, the vision includes creating particular programs and services for the more marginalised members of our community such as our homosexual youth, elders, ill, and disabled. Although there are other agencies that address some of these needs, the

SIPC Centre wishes to meet the special social needs not addressed by those agencies.

Additionally, we would like to create an **LGBTO** library to house the many collections (books, periodicals, movies, and music) existing in our community in one location so that those resources are accessible to the whole community. and meeting space for other LGBTQ organisations. Although we are building queer space, what we create will always be accessible to our straight friends and allies. To date, the **SIPC Centre** has developed a successful queer youth drop-in program for ages 14-19 that runs in space donated by the Fairfield Community Place. The Executive Director, Joan Kotarski and the staff at Fairfield have been wonderful in their support. This year we would like to expand the program to other areas of the city. We have also run several successful programs that address other age groups in the community and will continue to grow this aspect of our programs as well. We are busy creating a network with other agencies such as the **Youth Services** Providers Network, Antidote, and LifeCycles to create solutions to intersections of needs.

Speaking of thanks, there are many individuals in and around **Langham Court** who deserve thanks from each and every one of us. They are the theatre's secret elves who work hard at a variety of essential tasks without receiving payment, applause or program acknowledgement. Without them, our theatre would at best be less efficient and less pleasant a place to come to, at worst would grind slowly but inexorably to a halt.

In the Box Office, Denise has a team of dedicated, hard working elves who are on the front line dealing with the public, ensuring the right people get the right tickets, taking reservations, and above all showing the theatre goers that Langham Court is not only a friendly community theatre but also professional in its attitude and presentation. At the top of the list is **Dick Newson**, whose work on the ticket program has made it the most efficient and user friendly in the city. Next there's someone who is at the box office so often that I think she's stapled to the stool – Alexis Kuss who, along with her mother and father, Marilyn and Michael Kuss, have been invaluable volunteers. Not only did the Kuss family work through the summer on the renovations, but since then Alexis has demonstrated her indispensability in the Box Office and as Denise's righthand woman. Marilyn and Michael were not far behind their daughter, as they signed up to help back stage with The Odd Couple.

An All Round Good Sport: Jane French

Jane French began life on the northeast coast of Yorkshire in the middle of World War II. Soon after she was born, Jane and her family were forced to move inland due to the incessant bombing along the Eastern Seaboard.

Until 1945, when the family returned to the coast, Jane spent several idyllic years on the Yorkshire Moors, in the very centre of *Heartbeat* country. It was there that the athletic little girl learned to ride, a sport she thoroughly enjoyed and at which she became extremely adept.

However, it wasn't long before Jane's theatrical side came to the fore. As a child, she dressed herself and her sister in her mother's clothes and put on plays in the family garage for the neighbourhood children, who were charged a penny each by our embryonic producer.

With the end of war, Jane and her family returned to the coast to set up house at Saltburn-by-the-Sea. While at school there, Jane continued as a regular performer in productions and won a Gold Medal for her poetic recitations. She also spent much of her time demonstrating her skill in a variety of sports. Arts and athletics were Jane's twin loves, both in school and after.

At age seventeen, Jane went to secretarial college in Middlesborough, and after graduation began working for **British Steel**. While there, Jane continued to act in community theatre productions until she got married at age twenty and produced three babies within five years. With so much to do at home, Jane was forced to give up theatre for a while to concentrate on her family.

In 1966, Jane's husband, an officer in the **RAF**, was posted to Singapore; so Jane and the children went out there with him. While in Singapore, Jane had the luxury of a live-in baby-sitter who enabled her to return to acting. There was a beautiful little theatre on the RAF base that raised money for the local charities through their productions, and in the three years that the family was stationed in Singapore, Jane became one of the most active members of that **RAF** base theatre community.

In 1970, the British vacated Singapore so Jane and her family returned to Yorkshire. Once more, Jane became involved in the productions at the local community theatre. As well as acting, directing, and producing, Jane had a full time job and was still having to cope on the domestic front. Then, in 1977, Jane's husband joined the **Canadian Armed Forces** and the family was posted to Victoria. Jane's first priority upon arriving here was to find a theatre in which she could become involved. That's how she happened to walk in on the auditions for *The Killing of Sister George* and to end up with the part of Mrs. Mercy Croft. The show opened in June 1978 and, on being told what part her daughter had agreed to take on, Jane's mother wrote from England in horror "You are not doing that play, are you!!?"

Jane also began working as Office Manager for the Chief of Obstetrics at **Royal Jubilee Hospital**, a job she held for eighteen years until her employer retired; at which time Jane decided to work at **Chapters** where she would be surrounded by books, an idea that appealed to someone who loves to read as much as Jane does.

Meanwhile, at Langham Court, Jane followed her performance in *The Killing of Sister George* by taking on the role of Assistant Director for *Boeing Boeing*. Since then, Jane has starred in several productions including *Rose* (January 1988), Hobson's Choice (October 1992), and Ring Around the Moon (March 1994). She has also produced a number of plays including The Importance of Being Earnest, Breath of Spring, Salad Days, The Real Thing, The Diviners, and most recently, *Midsummer Night's Dream*. As well as acting and producing. Jane has worked on props and costumes and has been on the running crew for several productions including *Pride and Prejudice* and *Foxfire*. Jane also served on the Board for several years and recalls board meetings that went on all day. While on the Board, Jane did publicity for Langham Court, and remembers typing up press releases then delivering them by hand around the city. She has also been an invaluable volunteer at all the Costume Sales and at the Open Houses and at our First Annual Garage Sale held this past summer.

With eight grandchildren, Jane finds life to be quite hectic but she considers **Langham Court Theatre** her second home, and still finds time to remain actively involved.

News from the Costume Guild

On October 2, Ann-Marie Arneson led a

terrific **Costume Guild** workshop in the Lounge on creating a basic personal sewing pattern template (or sloper) for a bodice. Ably assisted by **Chris Stusek**, Ann-Marie kept **Toshik Bukowiecki**, **Lynn Cadrain**, **Lisa Leighton**, **Jean de Cartier** and **Karen Harper** focused on measurements, drafting theory and practice for a full three hours. Interest was so high, and there were so many questions, that we only completed the front half of our slopers.

Therefore, our next meeting will be the second part of the sloper workshop, on Sunday, November 28th, 1:00 p.m. to 4:00 p.m. in the Lounge. If time permits, we will also try to create a muslin (a fabric "draft" bodice made from the sloper).

If you couldn't make the first workshop, or if this is all news to you, you are as welcome as any of the Guild members who attended the first workshop.

Creating a sloper is a fundamental sewing skill, and at the heart of being able to translate an existing design into a sewing pattern, or creating an original design. Even if you don't aspire to designing, the basic knowledge you will acquire in making a sloper will inform all aspects of your sewing.

If you are interested in participating, please wear an old top, as we will be marking the muslins with permanent markers, and please bring the following materials (if you have them ... don't worry if you don't):

- sewing kit (scissors, straight and safety pins, measuring tape, etc.)

- yardstick
- pencil and eraser
- small or large T-square
- French curve

- medium-tip permanent markers in at least two colours (large tips won't work)

- muslin, old sheeting or other plain cotton or firm cottonblend woven fabric for the fitting (enough to fit a bodice front and back)

- heavy paper, Bristol board or non-corrugated cardboard big enough to transfer the bodice muslin onto ... this will become your template or sloper If you would rather just watch or help someone else with their sloper, no need to bring supplies.

We will have tea and coffee. Please feel free to bring treats to share.
