All four have substantial backgrounds in theatre and it was wonderful to have so many worthy choices. The ballots were cast and **Odile Nelson** was elected to the position - she will be planning the Guild's 85th season for 2013-14

The SGM also saw the election of another Life Member - **Barbara Waldner** was nominated and unamimously approved by the members. Barbara has been a long-time member and supporter of the theatre. She has ushered for many years, entertained us at numerous Christmas parties and donated the picture-hanging system in the lounge. We thank Barbara for all her contributions and welcome her to the "Lifers."

The meeting concluded with high spirits, and those remaining socialised at the barbeque and pot-luck. Thanks to all who attended.

A New Database Thanks to Marilyn



Marilyn Kuss has taken the archived programmes for Langham Court Theatre productions going back to 1930 and entered all the names from them into a computer system. This meant keying in more than 12,000 lines

of information showing production dates, play titles, performers, backstage help, and who did what, including all the board members at the time of each show.

Unfortunately, the record is not 100% complete, as the occasional programme or performance date is missing. However, the database will provide an extremely valuable

source of information. Not only is it a great historical and archival document, but it can also be used to see who has done what and for whom in recent shows. Directors and Producers will be able to look up the names of actors and backstage crew in order to find potential crew and cast members for future productions.

Our Local Arts Community Loses a Friend

Many **Langham Court Theatre** members were saddened to hear of the death of **Anne Tyler**, wife of one-time President and long-time Life Member, **Michael Tyler**. Anne died at age 76, following a long illness, on June 8th at her home in Victoria. In spite of ill health, Anne was always lively and warm, with a memorable smile, and it was a privilege to know her. She was an active supporter of the arts, and since she and Michael came to Victoria, they have given freely of their time and considerable expertise to a variety of arts local organisations including the **Victoria Theatre Guild**.

Although Anne has not been actively involved at **Langham Court Theatre** in recent years, she has been a loyal member of our audience. I am sure that many of you will recall her working on productions during the Eighties, painting scenery (one vivid picture is of Anne reaching up to paint the top of a tall flat whilst a very long and lanky member of the stage crew crouched down and painted at ground level). Anne and Michael were also extremely generous in opening their home on many occasions to **Victoria Theatre Guild** Board Members and others for meetings and get-togethers

Born to **Genevieve** and **William Schmitt** in Medina, NY, on December 12th, 1935, Anne attended **Nazareth College** in Rochester, New York before joining the **US Department of State Foreign Service** in 1957. After briefly attending the **Georgetown University Foreign Service Institute**, she took assignments in various embassies and consulates in Cambodia, South Africa, and Hong Kong. After her marriage to Michael in 1968, she left the Foreign Service and worked for the **Bank of America** in Hong Kong before joining her husband's company. She and Michael retired and moved to Victoria in 1981. Anne was highly regarded for her wide range of volunteer activities in Victoria, particularly in the arts community where she was a vigorous fund-raiser and organiser in support of the musical performing arts. While always modest concerning her own talents, she was regarded as a talented pianist.

Anne was a director of the **Bastion Theatre**, and for over ten years, served on the board of **Pacific Opera Victoria**. Recently she served as director of the **Victoria Conservatory of Music**. Anne is survived by her husband of 44 years, Michael, and by her three siblings, **William Schmitt**, Jr. of Flat Rock, North Carolina, **Sarah Donadoni** of Syracuse, NewYork, and **Peter Schmitt**, of Cedar Grove, New Jersey.

Our heartfelt sympathies go to Anne's brothers and sisters and particularly to our friend and fellow-member, Michael.

I am also grateful to Dave Hitchcock, Wendy Merk (our very own 2012-13 Production Chair) and Andrea Palin, who filled me in on the happenings at St. Luke's Players, KeepItSimple Productions and the G & S Society respectively.

No productions during July, does not mean the theatre has been empty. It seems that **Langham Court Theatre** is just as lively and active during the off-season as it is during the winter months. First of all, there was an informal meeting held to discuss the pros and cons of changing the role of the Production Chair. As happens so often with informal meetings, this one veered off topic. However, it was a productive gathering, and at the end it was decided that we need more such get-togethers to give members an opportunity to exchange views on what kind of a Community Theatre we want the **Victoria Theatre Guild** to be.

On the 8th of July, we got together again for the Summer General Meeting. The move to change the Production Chair to an Artistic Director was defeated, so we held elections for the 2013-2014 Production Chair. Four people -- all of whom would have been fantastic – were nominated. Alas, we couldn't elect everyone, but we did elect **Odile Nelson** who has much to contribute. Sylvia Rhodes nominated a new Life Member, **Barb Waldner**, and without a second's hesitation everyone in the room demonstrated their pleasure in the choice with loud cheers, whistles and a vigorous clapping of hands.

The day after the meeting, the G.A.S. crew arrived bright and early, and the week-long set-up began. Once again, **Ned Lemley** headed up an amazing crew of volunteers, one or two of whom only come to Langham Court **Theatre** to help with the Costume Sale. It was a busy week, there were a lot of elegant costumes as well as the usual heap of leisure wear and exercise gear (much of which came from the closet of yours truly). We were extremely fortunate to have **Dick Newson** and **Alan** MacKenzie on hand to create clothes racks, shoe racks, hat racks, handbag display areas and to hang mirrors. We were also blessed to have **Lynn Cadrain** as the *chef du jour*. Lynn must have spent days creating the feast she brought in. Everything from soup to salads to a chocolate trifle that was completely and utterly sinful. My very full tummy thanks you, Lynn.

There were three different sales happening at the same time. A variety of props, knick-knacks and stuffed animals were on sale in the rehearsal room under the watchful eyes of **Sally Crickman**, **Jean de Cartier** and **Carol Ann Moore**, the main G.A.S. took place in the lounge and on stage, while the Costume Workshop sale of fabric was going on in the hallway, headed up by our own material girl, **Lisa Leighton**. Although there weren't as many customers this year as there were in previous years, the ones who came spent more money, so it was a very contented Costume Loft Manager who was finally able to collapse after an exhausting week's work.

As soon as the sale was over, work began on *84*, *Charing Cross Road* with production meetings, auditions, call-backs and a read-through at the end of the month. And things won't get any less busy in August, which kicks off with auditions for *Lady Windermere's Fan* on the 10th and 11th, the Rockland-wide garage sale on the 18th, and the Fringe starting on the 23rd. And, for those looking for a position in the theatre, there are the application deadlines on the 15th and the 30th.

In spite of all the activity, I hope everyone will have the opportunity to enjoy the summer sunshine (as long as it stays with us.

Rockland Avenue 150th Anniversary Celebration

The Giant Annual Sale

It's after 11 p. m. and I'm still awake on the day of the **G.A.S**. I got home at 4:00 p.m.! Last year we quit at 4:00 p.m. and then I spent hours the following week finishing all the stuff that wasn't finished on the day of the sale. The take-down this year took only two hours! I can't quite believe it. I'm not going to have to spend very much time finishing off this year! Those who stayed to the end were stalwart, and I'm so glad I made arrangements with the young, the strong, and the beautiful to be there late in the day to heft and haul.

It was an exciting day, and I only encountered one unhappy person out of all those who were there, and her unhappiness was not due to anything we did, she was just going to be unhappy no matter what. All of you who worked so long and so hard seemed happy and strong (even though some of us elders were dealing with aches and pains). The crowd who came to buy also seemed happy. This was the smallest crowd in the four years I've been doing this. But they spent more! It looks like we made approximately \$1000 more than we made at the last two Costume Sales. Also, we set up in six days instead of seven, and could probably have done it in five with just a little more effort each day.

It is clear that having pre-sales is worthwhile, as we garnered more than \$1000 during the week we set up. The formula went like this: as volunteers worked and found things they wanted. I sold it to them for double the price on **sale** day. When people walked in off the street and found something they liked, I sold it to them for what they offered, or triple the **sale day** price.

And Oscars for The Best G.A.S of 2012 go to . . .

Our regular Langham Court crew spent many hours turning our theatre into a fashion bazaar. Thank you, Alan MacKenzie and Dick Newson, you contributed soooo

very much. The rest of the transformation was due to our wonderful list of volunteers.

The set up: two of my children and all my grandchildren (I paid them \$5 each ...only the kids, for an hour of hauling things upstairs!) They loved it, and us oldsters didn't get over-taxed on the stairs. Others involved were: G.A.S. veteran **Mary Godspeed**, someone I count on. On the day of the sale, Mary was the go-to person for any questions about the clothes on the stage; **Peta** and **Alan MacKenzie**, who spent many hours building and beautifying the huge shoe collection; Madeleine Mills and Jane Krieger (Target Theatre and St. Luke's regulars), who did a huge amount of work culling our collection (others who helped to cull included **Susan Ferguson** and **Di Madill**) and helping set up. Madeleine's daughter **Kate Moers** helped out on the day and also helped her mom labeling new boxes in the Loft as well as helping customers decide where to go first by carrying a sign board describing each room, including the sale of props in the rehearsal room.

Others who helped with the set up: Sally Crickman, who had her own fish to fry with the props sale; **Franklyn** Porter and his mother, Judy Porter (last year Judy took over the task of hanger wrangling from your editor and has sorted and boxed all the spare hangers into categories ready for storage – thanks Judy, great job). The hangers will be picked up shortly by Kate Moers and Brian von Prong (see him on Youtube as Freedman in the Kitchen) and stored in Kate's garden shed until next year. Kate has been a costumer at Langham Court Theatre and for Colin **Skinner Productions**. **Jane French** was there every day and did so much.. Jane has given so much to our theatre over the years. She's a positive person who makes things happy. **Vinnie Chadwick** was indispensable as an arbiter of cost and taste; another person able to laugh and have a good time while working. We all consulted her, and she was our Fashionista of Choice for the day of sale in the lounge. Also an indispensible member of the pricing crew, **Pearl Arden,** who contributes so much to the theatre in so many ways. **Sylvia Rhodes** not only donated many items again this year but also spent many hours helping set up and was there on the day, what a Courtier! She knows how to create a laugh! Corinna Gilland, editor of our newsletter, was there every day, thank you Corinna.

Sally Crickman, Jean de Cartier, and Carol Anne Moore held a sale of art, books, and prop room bric-a-brac in the rehearsal room that brought in more funds for Langham Court Theatre. They all added hours of effort to the G.A.S. during the week leading up. Marilyn Kuss has been active in our theatre for a couple of years, and she and her husband, Michael (on the board) and her daughter Alexis (box office until recently) have given so much to the

Guild. **Eileen Bennet**t helped me set this up. Thanks Eileen, a stage manager extroadinaire.

A special thank-you has to go to **Janice Lynn Cadrain** who spent many culinary hours creating a feast fit for starving workers. Lynn, you are an amazing chef, and that trifle was sin in a bowl. Also, a great big thank-you to **Fran Patterson**, who stood in the rain at the entrance to Langham Court Road and greeted customers advising them where to park.

Worthy of special mention: **Aja Young** has been working Saturdays for more than a year. She graduated from **Vic High** this spring and is going off to an Art College in Montreal this autumn. Thank you, **Aja**, for subbing for me when I couldn't be there and for all your special people skills that help our theatre be a friendly place to those who come to us for costumes. You have been an asset to the Costume Loft and we will miss you. *Bon chance*!

Another young volunteer who has contributed is **Cecilia Maybe**. **Antoinette Church** is a repeater, she just can't stay away, and she once again manned the jewelry concession (artistically displayed by Aja) for the G.A.S. *Merci*, Antoinette, we love you. On the day, **Wendy Magahay** and **Garth Taylor** manned the cash boxes and **Jill Groves** looked after the debit and credit card customers for the entire sale. Many thanks to the three of you.

I don't want to overlook anyone, but fear I may have. New to us: **Teresa Butler**, who wants to come back next year! **Jackie Chernier**, who also wants to come back next year! **Beth** (alas I don't have Beth's last name) who has been here for at least three years and wants to do it again (she

started out as a customer and recalls standing in the early morning line-up watching John Gilliland perform close-up magic). Oh, I left off another Courtier, Diana Keating and another, Caroline MacKenzie de Korte, who you will remember as Titania in Midsummer Night's Dream and other roles. Caroline teaches drama at Colquitz Middle School and is a frequent flyer in The Loft. She pitched in and helped us set up, and she bought a huge amount of the clothing and material that the Royal Provincial Museum gave us, including Oriental material from the Peking Opera. We are hoping to hand on to our local Chinese Benevolent Society the vintage shoes that came in the same donation and didn't sell.

By my calculation, more than 231 volunteer hours were spent by those helping with the G.A.S on the day of the sale, and more than 500 volunteer hours went into setting up, running and dismantling the G.A.S. as a whole. This does not include the many, many hours spent by numerous ladies culling the collection in the Loft before the set-up week for the sale. We don't have an accurate count of hours because many volunteers didn't sign in or didn't sign out! Suffice it to say it all got done because Langham Courtiers know how to work together and have fun and get the job done.

We had a beautiful long First Nations war bonnet that has gone missing. It didn't disappear as rented. That means someone of us entered the Loft and left with the bonnet.
