Notes from the Costume Workshop

Annual Sale

We had so many comments this year about how great it was to have the fabrics et al downstairs in the Rehearsal Room rather than in the upstairs hallway. It was so much easier for everybody working our part of the sale, and for the patrons, to be able to pread out and actually are great thing. That along with the volume of our

spread out and actually see everything. That, along with the volume of our offerings this year (thank you, donors!!), really made a difference. Pre-sales (for volunteers who couldn't be there on the day of the sale) plus sales-day **sales totalled \$726.30**. Last year we made just about \$300, so this was a fantastic result. We sold our four older sewing machines and serger, and we plan to purchase another new sewing machine. That will give us two very recent sergers and two very recent sewing machines for our costumers and Costume Guild workshops.

Huge and heartfelt thanks to **Gloria Snider** (and **"Thumb"**), **Chris Stusek**, **Wendy London**, **Erika Schweitzer** and **Lynn Cadrain** for their tireless work and good humour throughout the prep week and on sale day. **Another big thank you** to everyone who lent us a hand with setting up and tearing down, especially **Alan Mackenzie** and **Alex Carroll**. Thank you, everybody!!



Costume Loft Inventory Project

We are underway! Thanks to the volunteer efforts of **Erika**, **Angelika** and **Christine Schweitzer**, and with materials funding from **the Board**, the inventory project is up and running. The goal is to photograph and create a database record for each piece in the Costume Loft collection, and permanently attach a barcoded label to everything that can be labelled. Jewellery, accessories and items that cannot carry a label will be tag-labelled or bag-labelled. The clothing labels include care instructions and a space for writing in a size.

Once the collection has been inventoried and labelled, the Costume Loft should be able to check items in and out with the barcode scanner gun (as well as manually on the computer) and generate invoices, reminders and reports electronically. Valuations will also be added to each item record, for insurance purposes.

The **Schweitzers** will do as much as they can of the collection this summer. Based on a rough count of just what is on the hanging racks after Ned's 'radi-cull' this spring (4,700+), we estimate that there are more than 10,000 individual pieces in the Loft. The ladies bring considerable skills to the project in photography, computing, databases, sewing and costuming. They will be set up in the Lounge through July and August, until the Fringe comes in, and then wherever we can find them some space in the theatre until September.

For their help with this project, thanks also to **Ned Lemley**, **Mike Kuss**, **Dick Newson**, **Alan MacKenzie**, **Denise Brown** and **Chad Laidlaw**.

Costume Loft Alterations (so to speak)

Thanks to **Dick Newson** and **Mike Kuss** for getting the Costume Loft renos underway just after the big sale. Among other improvements, these should help make room for the special collection and accessories, improve the traffic flow around the main entrance and desk areas, and create space for the inventory computer to come.

Costume Guild Workshops

It's planning time again! We had some really popular workshops last season, and we'd like to continue to offer opportunities for all skill levels this season on a variety of topics. If you have an idea for a workshop, please let me know right away. We hope to start the monthly workshops in September, so watch the newsletter and the website for details.

I was playing Cass and our Director, **Drew Kemp**, had me entering into the audience from the corridor door (where the coats are hung). This passage way was barred from anyone -- from audience and backstage crew – once the curtain went up. I was listening by the door for my cue. I heard the cue and opened the door with a flourish, when to my horror my skirt, which was satin and full, caught on a nail. I felt a huge tug and heard and felt the ripping. I realised with the draught, that my skirt was torn right up to my waist! I clutched it together in one hand and played the entire scene on sheer technique, trying to see if my fellow actors on stage were looking as panicked as I felt.

At the end of the act, I rushed downstairs and begged the wardrobe mistress to try and cobble the rip together. She twisted me around, looked at the skirt, then told me that there was nothing to be seen. I was incredulous. At the end of the play, I went back to my passage-way entrance to find something that could have caught my skirt. The area was completely smooth – not a nail or splinter to be seen.

I was then told about the young girl who had been at the Langham Boarding School. She had apparently killed herself in the gymn, which is now the theatre. According to **Alan MacKenzie**, our girl-ghost was known to mess about with the sound equipment. He told me he had found yards of audiotape pulled out and thrown on the floor at a time when there had been no-one in the theatre. It is said that she is a naughty little ghost who likes to play tricks. I now believe it was she who made me think my skirt was ripped. I do hope she enjoyed my reaction.
