Director's Notes

A couple of weeks into rehearsals, raccoons raided the pond in our garden. We don't have koi or anything, just goldfish. Two or three have successfully made it through four winters, a handful more have been born and bred in situ. Another dozen or so were brought in as the replacement team after the great (and extremely depressing) Raccoon Massacre/Sushi Feast of 2015. This time around, the raccoons only managed to grab the oldest and biggest fish, the impressive and no doubt influential four-and-a-half inch "Mr. Big Guy," which the lethal masked bandits carried around the house to consume on our back stairs.

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About the Playwright




MORRIS PANYCH

Morris Panych, playwright, director and actor was born in Calgary, on June 30th, 1952. He studied at the Northern Alberta Institute of Technology, and the University of British Columbia. He has twice been the recipient of the Governor's General Literary Award, first in 1994, and again in 2004 for *Girl in the Goldfish Bowl*. In the last few years he has emerged as a major figure in Canadian theatre and is a driving force in the Vancouver and Toronto theatre communities.

Panych came to public attention for his two-hander (a play for two actors) Last Call: A Post-Nuclear Cabaret (1982), which he wrote and in which he starred. The show was revised for CBC television, bringing Panych to national attention. He has since gained world notice; his play Vigil (1995, renamed Auntie & Me) played in London's West End in 2003 and in Paris in 2004 as well as in the US and in more than 30 Canadian cities.

Since 2000, Panych has directed extensively: opera, contemporary and period drama, as well as his own work. He has also acted on television (notably, on The X-Files), and continues to write, the activity that most interests him. Morris Panych continues a prolific career in Canadian theatre. Among his honours are 12 Jessie Awards in Vancouver, a Dora Award in Toronto, and the Chalmers Award.

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
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
