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

Audition Format: 2–3 short monologues that illustrate your full range and reflect the role for which you wish to be considered. These should be from the script and memorized.

Callbacks Format: Readings from the script; sides will be made available.

SYNOPSIS

When Henrietta Leavitt begins work at the Harvard Observatory in the early 1900s, she isn't allowed to touch a telescope or express an original idea. Instead, she joins a group of women "computers," charting the stars for a renowned astronomer who calculates projects in "girl hours" and has no time for the women's probing theories. As Henrietta, in her free time, attempts to measure the light and distance of stars, she must also take measure of her life on Earth, trying to balance her dedication to science with family obligations and the possibility of love. The true story of 19th-century astronomer Henrietta Leavitt explores a woman's place in society during a time of immense scientific discoveries, when women's ideas were dismissed until men claimed credit for them. Social progress, like scientific progress, can be hard to see when one is trapped among earthly complications; Henrietta Leavitt and her female peers believe in both, and their dedication changed the way we understand both the heavens and Earth.

ROLES

The play takes place over twenty years. Ages noted are for characters at beginning of the play. Accent and some dancing will be required. There will be a dialect coach and a choreographer provided.

AUDITIONS

F1: Henrietta Leavitt - Brilliant, probing and driven. 30s

F2: Margaret Leavitt – Henrietta's sister, much more traditional. A caregiver. 30s

M1: Peter Shaw -

An apprentice in the Harvard lab where Henrietta works. 30s

F3: Annie Cannon – Lead female worker in the lab. A tough firebrand. 30s – 40s

F4: Williamina Fleming – Another lab worker. Whip-smart, fun, and funny. Scottish. 40s – 50s

Please read the script prior to auditions. Copies are available at the Box Office and require a \$10 deposit that will be returned when the script is returned.

Note: Performing at Langham Court Theatre is a major 3–4 month commitment. If you cannot be available for the majority of the rehearsal schedule and ALL of the performance schedule, you should NOT audition.

EXCERPTS FROM KARRIE AYOTTE'S SPEECH Commentoring Carol-Anne's Work

When Kevin Stinson contacted me in October to ask if I would say a few words about Carol-Anne Moore in support of the recommendation that she be provided a life membership at Langham, I couldn't have been more delighted, if you'll pardon the pun.

In 2006, her first year at Langham, Carol-Anne helped out with lights for the theatre's production of All My Sons. Many other theatre volunteer jobs followed, such as board operator, props (and managing the props room), lighting crew, assistant stage manager, costumes and back stage crew. But eventually she ended up primarily in lighting. Carol-Anne tells the story how this came about after she fell down the stairs working as a props coordinator on *Bedroom Farce* and thought "that's the end of that."

It's lighting that seems to have captured her heart and her imagination – her list of involvements is dominated by time spent as a member of the lighting crew, as a lighting board operator and as a lighting designer.

When I asked why she enjoys lighting, she answered without hesitation that it's the creativity of it that draws her in, with the most creative liberty given on Don Keith's production of *Doubt*. This production stands out as one of her favourites.

Those who know Carol-Anne will know that she speaks her mind and isn't afraid to ask why things are done in a certain way. I found that out quickly when she



and I worked very closely together in her second year. Carol-Anne worked as my co-assistant lighting designer on *Waiting in the Wings*. She asked questions that challenged some of my long-ingrained design habits. I've grown as a result of my collaborations with Carol-Anne and I know she's grown over the years too. I remember distinctly the first time Carol-Anne worked up the courage to hang a light off a ladder, and then again, off the grid – those were huge personal accomplishments for her.

We worked together and collaborated on her first couple of designs. But once Carol-Anne got her confidence, she was away to the races. Since 2010, she has designed virtually one or more shows per year at Langham. She's been especially busy the last couple of seasons – with designs in Proof, Chorus of Disapproval, Quartet, Noises Off, Over the River and Through the Woods, and a co-designed Girl in the Goldfish Bowl.

I continue to look forward to our chances to collaborate – whether I'm asking her questions about what colour she'd use when she comes to one of my hangs, or whether she's picking my brains about how to tackle yet another challenge with the angles at Langham, Carol-Anne has grown into an amazing designer and an even better friend.

To me, Carol-Anne embodies the qualities of a life member at Langham. She is dedicated, passionate, open to collaboration and she lend her hands willingly to help with other productions. She's also very keen on paying it forward

> - on teaching new people what she's learned, so that there are more new designers who can take Langham forward, and so that when she's ready to step more firmly into her third retirement, she's confident she's leaving the ship in good hands.

It is my pleasure to speak to the Board's recommendation to the membership that Carol-Anne Moore be given a life membership.
