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
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LANGHAM COURT THEATRE ANNOUNCES DEPARTURE OF **GENERAL MANAGER**

Instead, what I find myself thinking about the most is how priviledged we are in our community. We get to close our doors, for now. Our volunteers are able to be safe at home. Our staff are staying protected and employed. I am grateful for the small opportunities of joy this pandemic has allowed the fortunate. Also, while costumes aren't being rented we can still have the carefree joy of getting dressed up at home!

As of May 12, The Costume Loft has opened for returns and clothing donations only on Tuesdays and Wednesdays from 11 a.m. to 1 p.m. We are set up in the Lounge for maximum physical distancing. seasons. She has also added programs to older posters as well as cast and crew identifications. Daunine has also designed memorial posters for Life Members who have passed away.

"I look forward to returning to archive work at Langham Court when it is safe for us to return during this COVID 19 setback."

ANSWERS

- 1. 179 (177 new seats and 2 old seats)
- A number of old bottles and a wallet were found. The bottles are in a display box in the scene shop and the owner of the wallet was able to be contacted and notified of its having been found about 50 years after it had been lost.
- 3. The last remaining bits of the exterior walls of the two original buildings that make up the theatre.
- 4. The circuit breaker would be tripped turning off the green room plugs ... and the lights in the lobby (which was in the diagonally opposite corner from the greenroom and one floor up ... don't ask!)
- 5. A wasp nest the size of a small car. Fortunately, it was not active.
- 6. Percy was the Mayor of Victoria at one time: also the President and Life Member of the Guild who saved the Guild from financial ruin with a personal loan that was eventually paid back to him. Langham might not exist today without him.
- 7. The stage house was not structurally sound and the back wall was bowing pronouncedly into the parking lot. The firm of Schick Shiner and Associates (theatre consultants) were hired to assess the problem and the result of their findings were that steel pillars at each side of the stage and a steel beam across them were installed to carry the weight of the roof and save the roof from caving in. The timing was extraordinary as the winter of 1996 saw the largest snowfall in Victoria's history. Without that renovation, the whole stage house would have come down and likely brought at least part of the auditorium roof down with it.

At that time, UVic students worked backstage, building sets and costumes, while Langham supplied all, or most, of the leading actors.

During our final dress rehearsal, the leading lady broke down in the middle of a scene; the exasperated director asking, "What NOW?" She responded in a weepy tone, "My head dress!" She didn't like her head dress. The costume designer had to design a new one immediately.

Now that's star power!


